

Burglary Relaxes Tense Boy

BERKELEY (UPI)—A University of California honor student told police today he embarked on a shoplifting and burglary spree as a form of relaxation during his studies.

"We couldn't afford to go to the movies," said Victor R. Sagis, 18, Millville, N.J. "I got tired of just using my mind and so when I'd take a walk to interrupt my studies I stole and broke into places as a kind of recreation."

Sagis and his wife, Teresita, 18, are both honor students in chemical engineering. Sagis was arrested Saturday night after Officer Floyd Holmes saw him running from a sporting goods store where a burglar alarm had just sounded. After leaping several five and six foot fences, Sagis stopped. Holmes arrested him and was treated at emergency hospital for exhaustion.

Police said Sagis never sold what he took and that all the items have been returned. He was first questioned Nov. 28 about two record albums taken from a drugstore. It then developed that Sagis had also collected such items as books, animals, school supplies and cosmetics.

Prized Slides Of Mexico Trip Taken By Thief

En route home from a Christmas trip to Fresno, his car was burglarized. The only thing stolen — his colored slides of Mexico. "I wish it had been my camera instead," Erickson commented sadly. He believes the loss occurred when he stopped at Marysville and he has enlisted the help of Marysville police in investigating the theft.

Sinatra Angry Over Revealing Of Wardrobe

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — Frank Sinatra, miffed at clothes designer Don Loper, will not wear any of the especially Loper-designed finery to President-elect John F. Kennedy's inauguration Jan. 20.

The singer believes Loper's revelation of his foppish wardrobe put him in a bad light.

Sinatra, who campaigned for Kennedy last fall, ordered thousands of dollars worth of clothes from Loper, all of which were made from imported fabrics and designed by Loper personally. His wardrobe included an invertebrate cape, ebony walking stick (with a silver crook), swallowtail coat, striped trousers, silk hat, a bowler, weskits, special white gloves, black patent leather pumps, and a Chesterfield coat with fancy braid piping.

But out they go. Sinatra now refuses to wear any of them. It was Loper's opinion that "Frank will be the most elegantly dressed man in Washington." This more than anything caused the thin crooner to blow his silk topper.

A spokesman for Sinatra said, "Frank felt Loper took advantage of the situation to capitalize personally on Frank's friendship with the president-elect. Believe me, he was really aggravated. What I'm trying to say is that he was mad."

CHECK FOR SURVIVORS

MUNICH, Germany (UPI)—The U.S. Air Force Tuesday presented Mayor George Brauchle a check for \$560 for the survivors of the 33 Germans killed in last month's crash of an Air Force plane here.

Air Force personnel in Germany and England raised the money. The plane, en route from Munich to a base in England, crashed in a crowded Munich shopping street. All 20 Americans on board, including 12 American students, were killed.
