Shasta Hobbyist Adept At Tin Art

MOUNT SHASTA—Mrs. Marie Kinstry, wife of Mount Shasta's Judge John Kinstry and well known clubwoman, has no difficulty choosing presents for her many friends. She just collects a supply of tin can lids, and makes all kinds of attractive jewelry.

A full display of the Kinstry jewelry carries many shapes, colors and patterns. A strip of tin cut with a pair of ordinary barber's shears will resemble delicate filigree work by silversmiths. Given a bit of gilt, and it resembles gold, or whatever other metal desired. This clever worker of metals can look at an intricate pattern, and turn out a similar design.

Besides enjoying this unusual hobby, and making friends happy with distinctive presents, Mrs. Kinstry is sought after to lecture, and illustrate her work to various clubs. She also is asked to make various objects to sell in charity affairs. But she never sells any of her work for her own gain. She says she is strictly an amateur.

To keep her in stock, all the Kinstry friends save choice can lids. The most choice material, says Mrs. Kinstry, are the shiny tins from big cans of fruit juice. They have real area for working into flower-like parts.

The first patterns undertaken by Mrs. Kinstry were candle holders. They still are popular items with friends. When no longer needed for candles, they may be worked into a bunch of poinsettias.

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
