Harness Snaps, Window Washer Left Dangling

PORTLAND (AP) — Part of a harness apparatus gave way and a window washer dangled for 10 minutes today from the fourth floor of the YMCA Building in downtown Portland.

"I wasn't too scared," said Darrell VanLom, 37, after he had lowered himself to safety with a rope dropped to him by a city employee.

VanLom said he was soaping the outside of a window on the fourth floor when one of the two window frame plugs into which his harness was hooked pulled loose. That left the 215-pound VanLom dangling 3 1/2 floors above Taylor Street.

Firemen arrived with a ladder truck at the same time that a city employee raced up to the fourth floor and dropped a rope to VanLom. The window washer lowered himself to the third floor, kicked out a window and was pulled inside by his assistant.

A building employee later told newsmen that VanLom had decided to wash windows from the inside the rest of the day. But a few minutes later, newsmen found VanLom washing outside windows again on the fourth floor. "I just told her that because she was so nervous," he said.

Mountie Saves Father Of 7 From Suicide

NEW WESTMINSTER, B. C. (AP) — For 70 minutes early Thursday a young Mountie sat cross-legged on a girder of the Pattullo Bridge — talking a father of seven out of suicide.

Then the man came down, shook the Mountie's hand and said: "Thank you pal. I appreciate it."

A motorist first saw the man climbing up a girder on the span's west side, 240 feet above the Fraser River. At the south end, the motorist told Royal Canadian Mounted Police Constable Laurie Marshall what he had seen.

Marshall raced to the scene, climbed up on the three-foot girder, and faced the man, 10 feet away.

He flipped him a cigaret. It was the first of many.

Marshall said later: "He kept talking and talking. He had been drinking, but wasn't incoherent."

RCMP Sgt. John Brucker arrived on the scene, recognized the man and called him by his first name. It eased the tension.

Twice the man threatened the jump, easing over as ladders were pushed toward him.

"Go back," he shouted, "or I'll go over."

Then he came down, and police took him to jail. So far, no charge has been filed.

Neil's Stephen Lewis, 11, Joseph, was killed as the car in which he was riding crashed into the rear of a truck on a road between Joseph and Enterprise in northeastern Oregon.

His mother, Mrs. Nela Lewis, who was driving and two other sons, John, 9, and Leonard, 7, were injured. No one was injured in the truck.

Mrs. Gladys Lee, 45, Portland, was killed as she tried to walk across a Portland street. The car driver, Patricia Edith Hall, 25, Portland, said she did not see Mrs. Lee until too late.

That increased the January traffic toll in Oregon to 17.
