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## Splendor Of Taj Mahal Impressive To Visitors

From Cheops Pyramid to the Cathedral of Chartres, of all the edifices built by man, the one which has probably been most universally praised is the gleaming white tomb in Agra—the Taj Mahal. Other monuments of man are taller, or took longer to build, or cost more—but none can equal the Taj in numbers of admirers.

The wife of one British officer in India, asked for her opinion of the Taj, said that she would gladly die right then if she thought her husband would perpetuate her memory with such a magnificent memento.

Certainly, the building is the greatest compliment ever paid by a monarch to his consort. The Taj was built by Shah Jehan as a tomb for his favorite wife, Arjuman Banu, on whom he had bestowed the title of Mumtaz Mahal—the "Beloved of the Palace." It is from her title that the edifice receives its name.

The greatest example of Mogul architecture finished in 1632 took 17 years to build and no one could possibly count the cost. Designers and artisans were imported from all sections of Asia as well as Europe, but presumably the guiding hand throughout the construction was the Shah himself.

The essential design of the building is simple: a giant dome surrounded by four smaller domes rises above a square marble terrace, and at each corner of the terrace there is a slender graceful minaret. But the intricacies of the building are endless. The corridors and facades are lined with delicate screens of marble, and the entire building is covered with flower inlays made of jade, carnelian, agate, lapis-lazuli, sapphire and mother-of-pearl.

Once the flowers contained precious stones—sapphires, rubies, and diamonds, and though most of them have been looted through the centuries and replaced by semi-precious stones; still many of the original gems remain, high on the walls and dome. Their radiance gleams in the sun or moonlight. The sarcophagus of Mumtaz Mahal once contained the Koh-i-Nor diamond, a gem of 186 carats. The diamond was removed to decorate the Peacock Throne, and today the gem adorns the British crown worn by queens (supposedly it brings bad luck to any male who wears it).
