

Yreka WSCS Plans Dinner

YREKA—Date for the annual chicken and tamale pie dinner sponsored by the Yreka Women's Society of Christian Service has been set for Feb. 9 in the basement hall of the Yreka Methodist church.

Plans were discussed for the event during an all-day session held Tuesday with Mrs. Don Clements presiding in the absence of the president, Mrs. James Sullivan.

An announcement was made that the Yreka WSCS will hold a joint meeting with the Montague WSCS Jan. 13 at the Montague church. Dr. D. Bunch, missionary from South America, will speak.

At noon, a sack lunch was served with members of the Ruth Circle serving the dessert and coffee.

At 1 o'clock the group reconvened for the afternoon program which featured Marie Dharmobro, American Field Service exchange student from Indonesia. She was introduced by Mrs. Tom Dickinson of Yreka, representative for the AFS.

The student, a senior this year at Yreka High School, and a guest at the home of Dr. and Mrs. Robert Stewart, spoke on her country, describing its industry, climate, customs, methods of transportation and its people.

She told that the homes in her country are much like those in America and family life is similar. However, she said, there are no refrigerators, or freezers, and marketing must be done every day.

Marie also told that teenagers do not date before they are 16 and most young people marry between the ages of 20 and 25 now. A girl in former years married a man of her parents' choice between the ages of 13 and 15 years, but in modern day Indonesia young people may select their own husband or wife.

Schools in her country, she said, are now coeducational as they are in America, with classes held six days a week. She is studying to be a home economics high school teacher.

Following the young woman's address, Mrs. Harold Evelt and Mrs. Don Clements read articles on the World's Federation of Methodist Women. The meeting was concluded with Mrs. Harold C. Coleman reading the prayer.
