She will continue the topic with special emphasis on teenagers on Wednesday, Jan. 18, at the same place. Both meetings will begin at 7:30 p.m. A question and answer period will follow both discussions.

Klamath County has been selected as a pilot county for a home extension course on "Parent-Teenage Relationships." Mrs. Frasier will train leaders from each of the Home Extension units during the week.

In announcing the plans, Mrs. Dyer said, "We are fortunate to have Mrs. Frasier as she is an authority on family living that is recognized by state and national groups. She has had the unique honor of representing the Federal Extension Service twice in the past year at White House conferences in Washington, D.C. Last March she attended the White House Conference on Children and Youth. This past week she was in Washington attending the White House Conference on Aging."

Mrs. Frasier was formerly chairman of the Child Development Department at Washington State University. There she taught courses in child development and family relations and supervised a nursery school for preschool children.

She has also had experience as a child welfare worker. In this capacity she worked with disturbed and delinquent children, as well as supervising 30 children in various foster homes in the county and has worked in a private agency as a counselor on marital and family problems.

She is a graduate of Washington State University and holds a masters degree from the University of Smith College School for Social Work in Massachusetts, is a past president of the Washington Home Economics Association and Pacific Northwest Conference on Family Relations.

The family life expert is the mother of three children, two sons, Cline and Donald, and a daughter, Carolyn. One son is an engineer and the other is training to be a jet pilot. Her daughter is a sophomore at Oregon State College. Her husband was poultry specialist at Washington State University before his death.

Leaders Of 4-H Plan To Attend OSC Meeting

Several Klamath County 4-H Club leaders will travel to Corvallis Jan. 25 to take part in the state 4-H leaders' conference Jan. 25 through 27 at Oregon State College.

This is the first meeting Oregon's 4-H leaders have had in two years. Last year's conference was canceled because of a January snowstorm, says Carol Armstrong, county extension agent, who will also attend the conference.

Program highlights include a visit to the School of Science where leaders will learn about career possibilities for youth in chemistry, entomology, geology, math, natural resources, bacteriology and hygiene, nursing, oceanography and other areas within the school.

Purpose of the two-day program is to offer 4-H leaders from all parts of the state a chance to exchange ideas, get latest subject matter information in some of the 27 4-H project areas, and inspiration to better understand youth.

Recognition of 4-H leaders who have voluntarily led 4-H clubs 20 years will be special guests at the conference, says Miss Armstrong. These include John Heyden and Rex High from Klamath County.

Klamath County's leaders will also be competing for the top 4-H Leaders Association trophy which will be presented at the conference. Baker, Clackamas, Lincoln and Multnomah counties are past recipients.

Speakers at the conference are Mrs. Roberta Frasier, Oregon State College extension family life specialist, and Anthony Brandenthal, former manager of the Centennial Commission and trustee on the Oregon 4-H Club Foundation.

A total of 96 adults lead local 4-H clubs, says Miss Armstrong. Statewide, a total of 5,600 4-H leaders sponsor 33,500 youngsters in 4-H clubs.

Petitions are being circulated in the South Suburban area for a post office sub station in the Big Y Market.

Harry L. Wiard, who is spearheading the petition drive, said that a door-to-door canvass will be made. Petitions may also be signed at the Big Y Market, Peterson's Grocery, Leo's Barber Shop and Basin Builders.

The proposed sub station has a potential of 30,000 customers, Wiard said, with interested persons living also outside the heavily populated area. Fifteen hundred potential customers are within walking distance of the Big Y.

Pleads Guilty, Gets Probation

A Klamath Falls woman, Cleo Williams, 33, indicted for passing a forged check last May, pleaded guilty in circuit court Friday and was placed on probation for five years by Judge James M. Main of Medford. Miss Williams admitted giving a forged \$250 check to Chiloquin City Recorder Lloyd Peters on May 14, 1960, to provide bail for a friend, Leon Pearson, 33, Chiloquin.

A long delay was experienced in the case after Judge David R. Vandenberg disqualified himself because David Vandenberg Jr. was representing Miss Williams. She has been free on \$2,500 bail.

JAPANESE INVITE IKE

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Eisenhower has told a Japanese visitor he hopes to visit Japan later this year.

The President discussed the possible visit Thursday with Yasujiro Tsutsumi, former speaker of the Japanese House of Representatives.

Tsutsumi presented Eisenhower with a petition bearing the signatures of 68,000 Japanese who urged the President to reschedule the visit to Japan which was canceled last spring because of leftist riots.

Upon request of Gov. William A. Egan, permission was granted by the Department of Defense for the band to represent Alaska in the parade.

Duty for Minchinton is diversified. In addition to playing at civic functions and on-base ceremonies, he and other bandmen are often flown to remote areas.

At isolated sites in the region, the band plays for entertainment of Alaskan Air Command personnel who man aircraft control and warning facilities which support top cover defense for the United States.

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
