## Navy, Army To Communicate Via Satellite

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Navy and the Army plan to use a satellite to talk to each other. The Navy announced Thursday it will put communications equipment on a ship for radio voice and telegraphic contact with two Army stations ashore—using the proposed Advent satellite to relay the statements.

The Advent communications satellite is expected to be ready for tests in the spring of 1962. It is intended to orbit on an equatorial path at a height of about 22,000 miles, with its speed matched to the rotation of the earth. The effect of this will be to put the satellite into a relative fixed position above a given point on the earth.

DUNSMUIR — December was a comparatively quiet month for Dunsmuir police, Chief of Police Lee Clark told city councilmen Wednesday night.

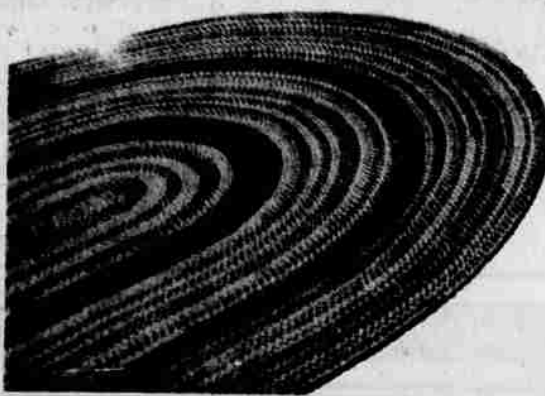
