

Man Cited In Siskiyou Is Arrested

YREKA—Siskiyou County Sheriff A. B. Cotlar has been advised by authorities in New York that they are holding Raymond Lee Gardner Jr., 23, Etina, on a warrant from this county. The warrant was issued from Etina Justice Court charging Gardner with obtaining money under false pretenses. Bail has been set at \$12,000.

An all-points bulletin for the arrest of Gardner was released early in November, following an extensive investigation by sheriff's deputies of Gardner's activities. He is believed to have bilked a Scott Valley couple, Mr. and Mrs. Norman Marvin, of about \$9,000. Mr. and Mrs. Marvin, who operate a ranch on Eastside Road near Fort Jones, told investigating officers that Gardner had extracted the above amount from Mrs. Marvin with promises of interest in bus lines coffee shops in Yreka, Redding and Medford.

Gardner, according to deputies, first contacted Mrs. Marvin, Sept. 18 and received \$400 from her, ostensibly to buy equipment for a coffee shop in Yreka, in which she was to have a half interest. On Sept. 27, Gardner contacted Mrs. Marvin again, requesting and receiving \$500 toward purchase of equipment, deputies said. A succession of similar incidents followed, said deputies, over a month's time.

On Oct. 26 Gardner rented a trailer in Yreka for 12 days, naming Pennsylvania as his destination. He packed up and left Scott Valley.

Deputies said they had received a tip stating Gardner was at Minocla, Nassau County, N.Y., and sent a bulletin to authorities there.

Officials there learned that Gardner had leased a house there, paying a substantial deposit. He was arrested there.

Cotlar has asked the attorney general's office to start extradition proceedings immediately, for Gardner's return to Siskiyou County.

Assemblyman Ponders School Tests Measure

SACRAMENTO (UPI)—Assemblyman Gordon H. Winton Jr., D-Merced, was reported Friday night to be preparing a bill which would call for the testing of California students in reading, mathematics, language and science.

State Department of Education officials said that Winton's bill was similar to a statewide testing proposal they planned to present to the legislature.

The department's proposal would allow local districts to select from among four or five nationally recognized achievement tests. It would require superintendents to report test results to their local boards and to the county. Results on a county-wide basis would be sent to the state.

The State Board of Education, which heard the department's proposal at a special meeting Friday night, called it "a good first step."

However, Louis H. Heilbron of San Francisco, board chairman, and Nathaniel S. Colley of Sacramento asked why rather than a single uniform test, rather than four or five, be given at a specified grade level to provide a statewide measurement of student achievement.

Frank Gillette of Monterey, who appeared for the California Association of School Administrators, told the board that choosing one test would "slow the competition and improvement" of tests prepared by testing companies.

"I think there's a tendency to search for simple answers in education, and uniform testing might be one of those," Gillette said.

"If you adopt a single test," Roy E. Sampson, state superintendent of public instruction, told the board, "you're going to be in the position of teaching the test."

Simpson said that schools would then concentrate solely on preparing their students to pass the test.

Thomas Shellhammer, researcher for the State Department of Education, stated that 84 per cent of California elementary school students presently take one achievement test. He said it would be interesting to correlate the results of that test with those of the other examinations available.

Francis W. Doyle, deputy state superintendent of public instruction, said that "in some instances not too much is done with the tests after they are administered."

A board member, Mrs. Talcott Bates of Carmel, said that "reporting of test results was the source of trouble, not the tests themselves."

"I'd like us to get something on the road, not closing our minds to further developments," she said.

Earlier, the board approved a number of the department's requests to the legislature for increased state aid to schools.

But a proposed \$6.5 million increase for junior colleges failed to win board approval. Board members went along with an increase for driver training classes if they were deemed "essential to safety" and conducted outside the regular school program.

Accompanying its recommendations to the legislature, a letter by the board was to be drawn up calling attention to California's "urgent need" for greater federal aid.

Animal Husbandry Day Scheduled At U Campus

TULELAKE—A full and factual program for swine raisers will be one of the attractions at the 1961 Animal Husbandry Livestock Day to be held Friday, Jan. 27, on the Davis campus of the University of California, K. G. Baggett, Tulelake farm adviser, announced plans for the meetings.

"The program will be geared to modern requirements of hog raising," said Hubert Heitman Jr. in charge of swine at Davis, "and will compare confinement production of swine with that of pastured hogs."

The swine program will get underway at 1 p.m. at the Hunt Hall auditorium. At 3 p.m. the meeting will continue at the Swine barn.

C. F. Kelly, agricultural engineer at Davis, will discuss the planning of a confinement enterprise. Kelly has designed many improvements in animal housing. Recently he studied swine operations in Europe. He will describe the new swine layout of the Charles Haney ranch in Merced County.

New research by University of California scientists on the space requirements for confined hogs will be described by T. E. Bond, USDA agricultural engineer. Bond recently coauthored a USDA bulletin on swine housing. In his report, he will discuss gain in weight and feed utilization which were studied on confined hogs up to market weight, with space allowance of five, 10 and 20 square feet.

Reuben Albaugh, extension livestock specialist, will talk on the raising of hogs on pasture. He will stress the excellent rate-of-gain and cost of production and will describe how good pastures can increase hog production in California. Several kinds of pastures will be compared.

When hogs are raised in confined dry lots away from pasture the feeding requirements must be more carefully understood and followed. The proper feeding methods will be outlined by Heitman, with special emphasis on confinement feeding.

A question and answer period will follow the talks. Various tours will then be conducted to the university's livestock herds and facilities. Those especially interested in swine will be able to see the herd books and swine research in progress.

California sheepmen will also hear about new ways of increasing the quality and production of their flocks at the 1961 Animal Husbandry Livestock Day.

In addition to talks on feeding and on effects of hormones, a special demonstration of sheep

experiments in progress will be presented at the new sheep barn, said Glen M. Spurlock, in charge of arranging the department's annual livestock meeting.

The sheep section of the program will begin at 9:30 a.m. in Hunt Hall auditorium, with William C. Weir talking on the results of supplementing replacement ewe lambs on the University's Hoiland field station range. Weir will describe the effects of supplementing with different kinds of feeds, fed at different levels, and fed once weekly compared with once daily.

Spurlock will report on how treating weaned lambs with testosterone and cortisone affects growth of lean tissue and deposition of fat.

The preparation and feeding of alfalfa, the livestock man's most important \$40 roughage, will be outlined by James H. Meyer. Part of Meyer's talk will be devoted to the so-called all-concentrate ration for fattening lambs.

Growth and carcass characteristics of rams and wethers will be covered by G. Eric Bradford. Meat quality aspects of the two sex groups will be compared in this concluding talk of the morning session.

Beginning at 3 o'clock, open house will be held at the new sheep barn. Bradford will be in charge of demonstrating ram and wether trials; crossed vs. purebred Suffolk and Hampshire rams and ewes; and the Tarheer breed.

From 5:30 to 7 p.m. will be a time of relaxation for university faculty and conference guests at the Faculty Club. A banquet, with Max Kleiber as the featured speaker, will follow at 7:30 p.m. Kleiber will speak on the subject of his forthcoming book, "Metabolism and the Fire of Life." Banquet tickets will be available during registration. Programs on horses, dairy cattle and beef cattle will also be presented during Livestock Day. The programs begin at 9:30 a.m.
