PORTLAND (AP) — A former Dallas, Texas, socialite was freed of one murder charge Monday but a second was promptly prepared by the district attorney's office, and she was returned to jail.

Three Garrett children and their governess, Patricia Mae Gravatt, 21, died in the fire. The dismissed charge covered the death of Gaye, 5 months. The new charge, on the same ground, was based on the death of Angela, 3. The other child who died was Vickie, 15 months.

It was apparent that the tall, red-haired Mrs. Garrett was ready for Monday's dismissal, but she was returned to the county jail after the judge's dismissal in which she said, "Thank God, I'm free."
