Asks Time For Plea

A Klamath Falls bowling alley owner accused of paying off on slot machines appeared in district court Tuesday and asked for additional time to consult his attorney.

Merle A. Hanscam, 42, owner of Lucky Lanes Bowling Alley, and his attorney, David R. Vandenberg Jr., were granted an extension until Friday by Judge Hal F. Coe.

Two counts of unlawfully possessing and operating a game of chance were filed against Hanscam by District Attorney Dale T. Crabtree. The owner was arrested by state police last Thursday after officers were allegedly paid off. Hanscam posted \$250 bail on each count.

More Grain Is Inspected

SALEM (AP) — Some two million more bushels of incoming grain was inspected at Portland last year than in 1959, the state Department of Agriculture said Monday.

It said 88,982,812 bushels was inspected in 1960, compared to 85,460,895 bushels in 1959.

Exports also increased. There were 71,569,370 bushels exported in 1960, compared to 58,762,456 bushels in 1959.

The bulk of the grain coming into Portland moved by river barge. Barges moved 17,879,241 bushels in 1960, compared to 13,129,838 in 1959. Truck movement held about even for each year at 10 million bushels.

Grain inspection showed a decrease in 1960 at both Pendleton and Astoria. The 1960 figure was 4,872,880 bushels at both stations, compared to 4,787,454 bushels checked at the same stations in 1959.



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
