SEPUVEDA, Calif. (UPI)—Labor and management concluded a two-hour grievance session Monday by agreeing that Mr. Tom the cat may go back to Pacific Mercury Electronic Corp. as the workers' mascot.

Management and representatives of Industrial Union Local #602, AFL-CIO, agreed to share costs for building the cat a shelter and a roomy sandbox.

Management last week ordered Mr. Tom off the premises after a six-year stay when a new security guard said Mr. Tom's personal habits led something to be desired.

The union had declared it would take the matter to the state arbitration service if necessary, but 300 of the firm's 600 workers signed a petition to get him back.
