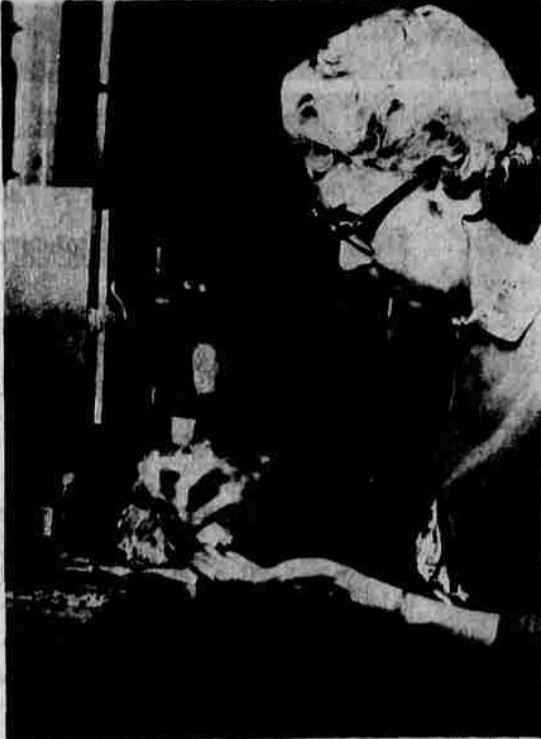
Yreka Senator Asks For Study

LOS ALTOS (UPI) — Six teenagers were arrested by police and Alcohol Beverage Control Board officers in a crackdown on a juvenile liquor ring operating on the parking lot of Los Altos High School.

Authorities said some of the spirits being sold to high school students was marked "not fit for public consumption." The ring had been under investigation for two months.

Five Los Altos High School boys and Joseph Clatti, 18, a student at Foothill College, were taken into custody Monday. Authorities said they were still looking for a man who reportedly sold the liquor to the teenage group for resale to their fellow students.

Ailing Boy Gets Signed Football

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — A football autographed by all the San Francisco Forty Niners, professional football team, was sent Monday to Larry Cooper, 10, Prineville, Ore., suffering from a malady which is expected to bring death within months.

Larry, suffering from bone cancer underwent an amputation of one leg in September, 1959. He went to school on crutches last year, but a month ago his condition became worse and he is now at home. He has not been informed that his malady will be fatal shortly.

The autographed Forty Niner football was accompanied by a note reading as follows:

"Hi Larry: I know you're a great Forty Niner fan. All the players got together to sign this ball just for you. We all are hoping to see you someday soon. Please don't forget us. And this next year we will be thinking about you." Ted Connolly, a guard, signed the note.

Bill Introduced To Cut Feather River Water Cost

SACRAMENTO (UPI) — The first of a series of bills to reduce the cost of water from the Feather River Project to agricultural users only.

Wife Denies Part In Child's Death

BAKERSFIELD, Calif. (UPI)—Richard A. Lindsey's wife denied through her attorney today Lindsey's claim that she killed Rose Marie Riddle, 6, after he kidnapped and assaulted the child.

Mrs. Dixie Lindsey, 23, mother of three children and expecting her fourth child next month, told attorney Eugene McKnight she was beaten when she begged her ex-convict husband to allow the girl to return home.

She claimed Lindsey threatened "to do her in" if she tried to stop him from assaulting the blonde, blue-eyed girl.

Lindsey, 30, a former mental patient, claimed Tuesday when Rose Marie's body was found in a field about an hour's ride from here that he raped and choked the child with his wife's consent—and that his wife then killed the child by beating her on the head with a tire lug wrench.

An autopsy showed Rose Marie had been hit at least 19 times on the head by the wrench found along with an empty whiskey bottle at the scene. Two of her front teeth were knocked out by the South Point, Ohio, is so named because it is the most southerly point in the state.

Wife Denies Part In Child's Death

BAKERSFIELD, Calif. (UPI)—blows and she had been raped, the autopsy showed.

A sheriff's deputy said, "He (Lindsey) told us his wife said she heard a cry from the girl as he was carrying her away from the car after the assault. He said his wife told him: 'If you won't kill her, I will.' Then she got out of the car with the wrench and struck Rose Marie over the head."

Lindsey, who has an auto theft record in Texas and a petty theft arrest here, and his wife were both arraigned on kidnap and murder charges Tuesday. Separate attorneys were appointed to represent them.

Deputies said they both appeared calm and unremorseful in telling of the crime.

Dist. Atty. Kit Nelson told reporters: "Lindsey said the rape and choking occurred in the front seat of their car while his wife was awake in the rear. He said he and his wife decided while in Bakersfield to find a little girl for the purpose of sexual intercourse."

"He said it was Mrs. Lindsey's idea to use the ruse about the payment of a dollar for housework. (Rose Marie was lured into

27, and his wife, Ethel, 23, suffered from a congenital heart ailment. The family moved to the area two months ago from Chandler, Ariz.
