

Oregon Tech Wrestlers Whip Red Raiders 25-11

ASHLAND (Special)—The Oregon Tech wrestlers successfully launched their 1961 wrestling campaign by defeating the Southern Oregon College Red Raiders 25-11 Wednesday afternoon.

The Techmen won five of the eight matches, two by pins, one by decision and two by forfeit. They also shared a draw in one bout.

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This is his second season for the Techmen.

SOC heavyweight George Moses scored an 8-3 decision over Owl Ed Anderson who made his debut as a college wrestler in Wednesday's match.

Hank Williams, the energetic Owl 157-pounder, decisioned Jim Hicks, 5-1. Williams is also an Owl letterman.

The draw occurred in the 137-pound match when Ken Williams of SOC and Glen Insteman, OTI, ended even up at 5 points each.

Owl John Weaver and Dave Kubesh, both lettermen, were forced to sit out the action when the Raiders were unable to afford the competition at the respective weights.

In an exciting exhibition match Oregon Tech's Lyle Thompson, 157, a freshman from Lebanon, pinned SOC's Darlyle Brerton in the second round.

Owl coach George Miller was highly pleased with the way his squad performed although he noted that perhaps since it was their first match they wrestled a little more conservatively than necessary.

The Owls' next outing comes Saturday night at Arcata, Calif., when they tangle with the Humboldt State College Lumberjacks.

Frank Burgess of Gonzaga, having never heard it is impolite to point, has pointed 446 times thus far in the collegiate basketball season and all other collegiate hoopsters in the Pacific Northwest know he's pointing for his second regional scoring title.

About the only question left: who'll place second?

Larry Applegate of Eastern Oregon College holds the No. 2 position at present with 248 points, closely pursued by Bill Wallin of Linfield with 244. Nine players have scored more than 200.

Burgess took the Northwest title a year ago with 751 points, averaging 29.9 per game. His average now is 29.7, a slight slump from his pace earlier in the season. He has been the national scoring leader.

Dutchman Signs To Guide Viks

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn. (UPI)—Norm Van Brocklin today had the job he "hoped and hoped for"—head coach of the Minnesota Vikings, newest member of the National Football League.

Van Brocklin, who quarterbacked the Philadelphia Eagles to the league championship, signed a three-year contract in the Vikings office Wednesday.

"I am realizing one of my greatest ambitions in receiving this job," he said.

General Manager Bert Rose of the Vikings said Van Brocklin's salary would not be disclosed. But Viking officials had been talking the neighborhood of \$20,000 and \$25,000.

12-Year Player Career
"My last season with Philadelphia was definitely my last as a player," Van Brocklin, 34, told United Press International. He moves into NFL coaching ranks after a 12-year career as one of the game's outstanding quarterbacks. He performed 12 seasons in the league, nine with the Los Angeles Rams and the last three with the Eagles.

Van Brocklin began his pro career with the Los Angeles Rams in 1949, after a great career at the University of Oregon.

He retired at the end of the 1957 season, but came back the following year and was traded to Philadelphia.

Has Leadership Ability
"Among Norm's greatest qualities as a player," said Rose, "is his demonstrated ability of leadership. We need that leadership as a new team in a tough league."

Tar Heels Go Great; 'Nowhere'

North Carolina's Tar Heels, once a good basketball team going somewhere, suddenly have become a great one going nowhere since the NCAA lowered its probationary boom nine days ago.

In four games since the penalty for recruiting violations was imposed in Pittsburgh, Jan. 10, the Tar Heels have whipped four straight Atlantic Coast Conference foes, boosted their winning streak to ten, their national ranking to sixth, and their season record to a tidy 12-2.

Wednesday night's game was the most impressive of all—a 97-66 rout of arch-rival N.C. State at Raleigh.

With All-America candidates York Larese and Doug Moe each scoring 27 points, the Tar Heels hit 66.7 per cent from the field in the second half, 33.5 for the game, and rolled to a 36 point lead at one stage.

Surging Xavier of Ohio (10-3) handed Louisville its second straight loss after 13 season-opening victories, 84-77; West Virginia (11-3) beat Pitt for the 12th time in their last 13 meetings, 73-68; and one and two point decisions were plentiful in other games on the Wednesday night program.

Pitt 6-7 held West Virginia sophomore Ron Thorn to eight points but veteran Lee Patrone took charge for the Mountaineers, controlling the play and scoring 19.

Maryland took a 63-62 thriller from Navy; Army edged Williams 60-58; Hank Whitney's two free throws and another by John Pateck gave Iowa State a 71-70 decision over Drake; Penn scored a 63-62 upset triumph over Villanova; and Wyoming, winning its fourth straight after a woeful start, nipped Air Force 61-60 in overtime.

Niagara (7-2) handed Syracuse (1-9) its eighth straight defeat, 97-77, and Colgate broke a 7-game losing streak, 67-57 over Columbia.

Huskies Face Win-Or-Else Hoop Action

Washington must win a game or two at Stanford this weekend or else join the California Bears on the shelf in the Big Five cage race.

Even though the conference race has not reached the half-way point, the Bears are already out of contention with four straight losses and mostly road games remaining.

Washington's plight is almost as bad. The Huskies are 1-3 as they move into Stanford's tiny pa-dion. The Cards are 1-0 in the league, but a 5-7 season mark would indicate they are heading for trouble in this year's conference race.

Thus it now appears that UCLA and Southern California only have each other to fear in deciding not only Big Five, but Pacific Coast honors this year. They are idle this week.

Other major cage action this weekend spotlights the Northwest independents. They play musical chairs as Idaho meets Oregon State, Washington State faces Oregon, and Gonzaga tangles with Seattle Friday.

Saturday's games pit Washington State-Oregon State, Portland and Alaska U., Montana State-Seattle, and Idaho-Oregon.

This is fertile territory for post-season basketball tournaments. One or two nominees to the NCAA tournament and/or the National Invitational Tournament could come out of this group.

But the trouble is that no team can get hot enough to earn a berth. Portland (10-5), Seattle (8-4) and Oregon State (7-5) show promise, but must put together some win streaks to get that tournament pot of gold that lies at the end of the cage rainbow for deserving quints.

There was no major hoop action on the Pacific Coast Wednesday night and none is scheduled for this evening.

Welu Threatens To Run, Hide

SAN BERNARDINO, Calif. (UPI)—Tall Billy Welu, the only champion left in the field, was off and running for his second annual All-Star Bowling Tournament entered its second day of finals competition at the National Orange Show Exhibit Hall.

Sugar Ray Fights Suit

NEW YORK (UPI)—Sugar Ray Robinson, claiming he didn't renege on a verbal contract to fight Gene Fullmer for the middleweight championship in October, 1956, is back in court today to ward off the blows of a \$75,000 suit filed against him by promoter Nicholas Troilo.

The case is being tried before Judge Lloyd F. MacMahon and a jury of 10 men and two women.

A telegram, submitted in evidence at Wednesday's hearing by Troilo's attorneys, purported to show that Robinson had agreed to sign for a \$125,000 guarantee, plus 60 per cent of the television and radio receipts. It was dated Sept. 7, 1956. Troilo is alleging that while Robinson did agree verbally to the Fullmer match, he failed to show up to sign the contracts.

Several other telegrams to the same effect were introduced to the court.

Under cross-examination, Troilo admitted that the proposed fight would have been his first boxing promotion and that at the same time he was not licensed to act as a promoter in the state of Pennsylvania.

Lane County Schools Ask Shift In Athletic Districts

EUGENE (AP)—Lane County high schools are considering a proposal to shift Roseburg, North Bend and Marshfield highs, into the Southern Oregon district for athletic competition.

The proposal came from Clay Egelston, North Salem athletic director, who said such a re-alignment would help his district, 8-A-1, solve football scheduling problems.

Egelston proposed that Roseburg, North Bend and Marshfield move from 5-A-1 into 8-A-1 which now includes Ashland, Crater of School Activities Association.
