Tomorrow afternoon at 1 o'clock in Pelican Court they will square off against the Bend Lava Bears for the second time this season.

Although the schedule makes for a short night the Pels are rated the easy favorites over both their competitors. The match with the Cavemen is the second in district competition, the first meeting of the two. The home stand with the Lava Bears is a return bout. In an earlier tangle with the Bend crew the Pelicans won every bout to register a convincing 50-5 triumph.

Big '8' Defenders Meet Arch-Rivals

Kansas State and Cincinnati, two striking college basketball powers, take to the road for key tests tonight and take it from DePaul's shocked Demons — the word is: Beware!

The 10th-ranked Kansas State Wildcats, unbeaten in their last 10 games, defend their Big Eight Conference lead against arch-rival Kansas at Lawrence. Surging Cincinnati, now 12-3 after a 7-game string of successes, is at tough Drake in a Missouri Valley Conference match.

Both would take kindly to avoiding the kind of trap the road has held this week for seventh-ranked DePaul. Their 12-game streak snapped Tuesday night at Notre Dame, the Demons moved on to Kalamazoo Thursday night and were ambushed by Western Michigan, 85-60.

Reawakened Houston (10-5),

which lost its five by a total of 17 points, spilled Texas A&M 83-65 Dayton (10-4) nipped state rival Wittenberg 46-45 and Kentucky Wesleyan edged St. Francis (Pa.), 78-76 in overtime, in other major games on Thursday night's slim program. Montana State College squeezed by Pacific Lutheran 73-70.

The Aggies, challenging for the Southwest Conference lead, became the third straight victim of Houston, which in its last two starts ended third-ranked Bradley's 18-game winning streak and then thumped St. Louis.

Houston broke a 83-83 tie in the last three minutes on two driving layups by Ted Luckenbill and two free throws by Tommy Thomson. The Aggies got their last two points on Don Stanley's jump shot with six seconds left. Luckenbill finished with 29 points for Houston, Stanley with 27 for the Hos-

KU Coach Lands Job In Portland

Klamath Union freshman basketball and jayvee football coach Wade Patterson has been appointed head football coach at Roosevelt High in Portland, it was reported Wednesday by Paul McCall, Portland athletic director.

His appointment at the head of the Rough Riders becomes in effect on June 2, this year, said McCall. Patterson replaces Marv Cross who experienced an 0-9 win-loss record this past season at Roosevelt. He will also serve as frosh basketball coach in addition to his academic duties.

Patterson, who established an enviable football record at the University of Idaho before graduation in 1950, came directly to Klamath Union after a tour of duty in the Army. Prior to his Pelican assignment Patterson had served as a coach in the service. He rejected pro football bids from the Chicago Cardinals, Ottawa and the Denver Broncos in order to take the Klamath Union job.

During his tenure as head of the jayvee grid program at KU Patterson's team compiled a 4-20-3 record, 1-tied record. In basketball to date his freshmen have won 12 games while losing only one.

Patterson will continue his Klamath Union duties until the close of school this spring.

KU athletic director Jim Johnson, when notified of Patterson's appointment, said, "We hate to see Wade go... his tremendous enthusiasm and his ability have reflected in everything he has done. His teams have done exceptionally well. It's a rarity that a coach so new in the business can step into a position such as this in an A-1 school... in fact, it almost never happens. We, of the KU staff, wish him the best of luck and we all feel that Roosevelt made a wise choice."
