These comments from a retired lawyer are typical of the men's reaction:

"I don't think they'll ever quit. This new 'togetherness' stuff is just the new look that nagging has taken on. I'm basing my statements on 45 years of marriage and all the wrangling I listened to in divorce cases while I was practicing law."

"I would say that nagging played a part in at least 85 percent of the divorces I handled through the years."

Since that seems to be the typical masculine reaction to the good word that women have given up nagging, I thought I ought to give the men a chance to have their say.

Maybe they have a point. Maybe this all emphasis on togetherness is just a refined kind of nagging, and husbands are beginning to see through it.

Maybe men regard as nagging any method a wife uses to make sure that what he does is what she wants him to do.
