## Knowland Sees Time Of Crisis

SALEM (AP) — Former Sen. William F. Knowland of California said Thursday that he believes the next eight months will be a period of crisis in the world.

Russia, he said, is going to try to test the administration of President John F. Kennedy in Berlin, the Far East, the Middle East and elsewhere in the world. "The great danger is that they may try to push harder than we are willing to be pushed," Knowland said.

Knowland, assistant publisher of the Oakland Tribune, said he felt Dean Rusk was a better choice for secretary of state than either Adlai Stevenson or Chester Bowles would have been. Kennedy named Rusk secretary of state, Bowles undersecretary of state and Stevenson ambassador to the United Nations.

Knowland stopped in Salem to visit with state legislators and then left by train for his home in Oakland. Earlier he spoke in Portland at a Republican fund-raising luncheon.

Knowland spoke earlier in the day at a Republican fund-raising luncheon in Portland. He said that the narrowness of the Democratic victory in the November presidential election should encourage Republicans.

Knowland said he has no plans to seek office again and that it is too early to say who will be the Republican California governor candidate.

SALEM (AP) — A proposal that Oregon launch a move to abolish the federal electoral college ran into opposition Thursday in the Senate State and Federal Affairs Committee.

## Graze Fee Is Pegged By Agency

WASHINGTON (AP) — The basic grazing fee to be charged for use of federal grazing districts ranges during 1961 will be 19 cents for each head of cattle a month, a three-cent reduction from the 1960 rate, the Interior Department announced Thursday.

The department said the reduction was based on the formula under which grazing fees are increased or decreased when average livestock prices at markets in the Western states change more than two cents a pound during the calendar year.

The 19-cent rate is the basic rate. The rate for a horse will be 38 cents a month and the rate for each five sheep or goats will be 19 cents a month. No fees are charged for livestock under six months old.

The fees apply to all federal grazing lands in 59 grazing districts lying in Montana, Idaho, Wyoming, Colorado, New Mexico, Arizona, Utah, Nevada, Oregon and California.

The department also said lease rentals on government lands outside of the grazing districts will also be lower than those charged in 1960. These rentals are based on a sliding scale related to the grazing capacity of the lands. The rates range from two mills to 76 cents an acre per year.

## Durham Will Speak At United Fund Awards Banquet In Klamath Falls

G. Roderic Durham, executive director of Oregon United Appeal, will be the featured speaker during the annual Klamath County United Fund Board meeting and awards banquet the evening of Feb. 13 at the Willard Hotel. The public is invited.

Durham, a native of Illinois, enrolled at Salvation Army College, San Francisco, in 1926, following discharge from the Army, and later was appointed an instructor in the college.

During the next 24 years he served Salvation Army in various capacities. He was appointed director of SA operations in Medford in 1933 and remained at that job until 1938, when he became executive director of the Oregon United Appeal.

During the past 25 years, Durham has become well known throughout the western states as an authority on youth work and youth problems. He has served as a volunteer in Boy Scout, YMCA and other youth work.

Durham has also gained recognition as a public speaker. He won first prize in the Beckman-Hollister public speech contest in San Francisco in 1948.

The director lives in Salem with his wife. They are parents of four children.

His job takes him into all parts of the state to supervise the field staff of the organization in work with local community chests and united funds.

## New Techniques Said Necessary

SALEM (AP) — New methods and techniques must be found to combat crime, Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton said Thursday in a keynote speech to his Crime Prevention Conference.

"Catching and punishing offenders has its value but in the light of statistics it has not proven to be the answer," he said.

Thornton said poverty, poor environment, improper child development, mental deficiency, lack of parental supervision and absence of religious training are some of the causes of crime.

"I believe that the major emphasis in any crime prevention program must be with the parents and must start with the home," he said. The conference ends Friday.
