

# Lakeview Swats Hornets, 65-52

## Newcomers Now Share Loop Lead

The newest member of the A-2 Rogue League, Lakeview, climbed into a share of the top rung on the loop ladder by blasting the Henley Hornets 65-52 at Henley Friday night.

A blistering two-man surge in the second quarter brought the Lakeview cagers up from an early 10-point deficit and then turned into a two-fisted team attack in the final period to hand the host Hornets their first loss in conference action.

Honker forward Garry Peters, who ended up with 22 points for the game high, went wild in the second quarter and scored six straight field goals plus three for four at the foul line to get his club back in the ball game after they closed out the first quarter on the short end of a 15-7 count.

His production, coupled with a brilliant display of free throw shooting by teammate Gary Reynolds, who hit five for six and two field goals during the big stanza, gave the Lakeviewers a 33-39 halftime margin.

A pair of quick jumpers by Hornet high man Ray Brown and soph Kent Gooding returned the lead to the Hornets with 3:37 left in the third frame at 39-37, but Honker Doug Maxwell found the range for four rapid buckets and the Hornets could never quite catch up again. At the end of the third the Honkers had a five-point, 47-42, spread.

Gooding opened the final frame with two quick layups to close the gap to one point but Peters retaliated with a like effort and from here on the Hornets were out of it. Every Honker on the floor got into the act and turned the game into a rout. Before it was over both Henley coach Jerry Johnson and Lakeview head man Ted McKee got a full set of reserves into the mopping-up process.

The shorter Lakeview five came within two of outrebounding their hosts, pulling down 41 to 43 for Henley. Gooding was the number one backboarder with 12 but Lakeview's Reynolds was right on his heels with 11.

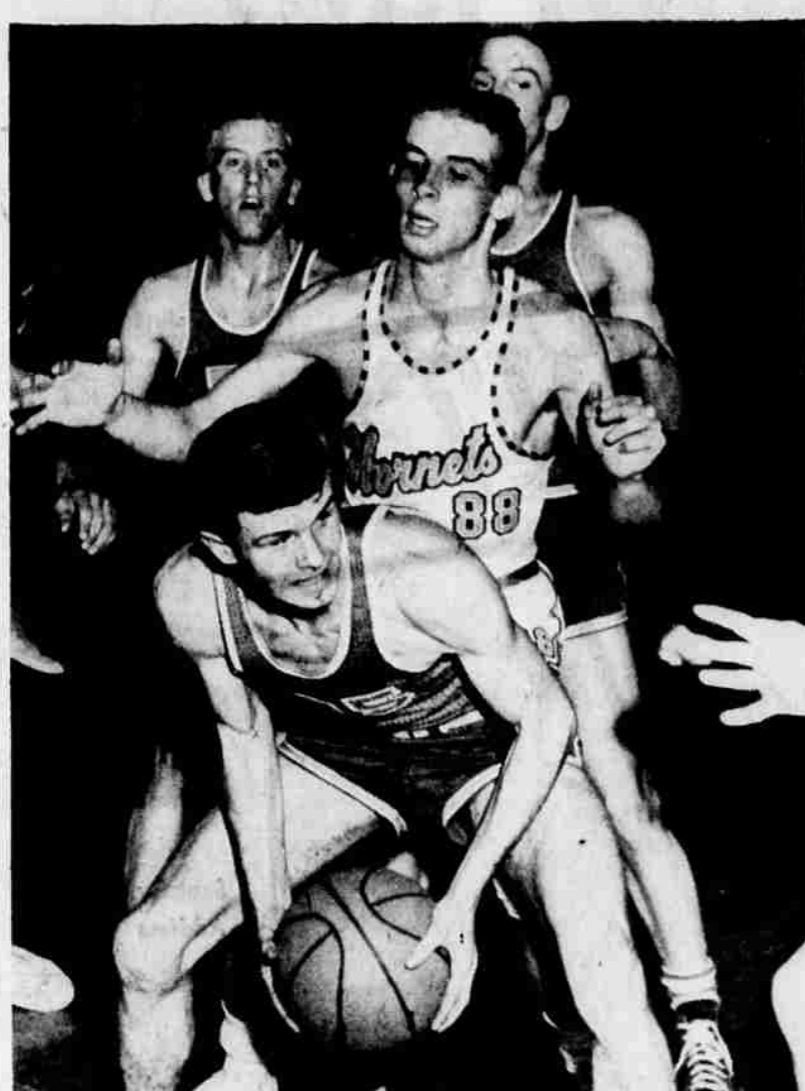
The Hornets were cold both from the field and the foul line. They netted 20 of 65 shots from the floor and hit only 12 of 20 at the free throw mark. The winners' sunk 24 or 52 two point attempts and counted 15-24 in gift shots.

Reynolds was second high with 19 points off five field goals and nine for 12 from the foul stripe.

Brown's 18 included eight field goals and two for two at the charity mark.

Gooding hit seven two-pointers and one free toss for 15 and Bert Allbritton added 11 points to the Henley cause. Maxwell, with 10 Honker counters, was the only other shooter to break into two figures.

# KU Halts Upset-Minded Comets; Claim 62-58 Win In Central Point

The Comets of Crater served notice on other Southern Oregon Conference foes that they are not a "soft touch" as they pushed the KU Pelicans right down to the final goal before dropping a 62-58 victory at Central Point Friday night.

It was an inspired band of Comets that almost pulled a stunning upset, falling short in the final minutes as an unruffled band of Pelicans stood off their upset effort and pulled out the important triumph.

In a ball game that was deadlocked 10 times, and one that saw Crater trailing by only a point in the final minute, it was the tremendous accuracy of Central Point at the foul line, plus an outstanding effort by Loyd Higginbotham that kept the Pelicans from pulling away from their unranked foe.

It was a combination of Wally Palmberg, Bruce Brickner and Gary Patzke that paced the fourth quarter Pelican effort and staved off the Crater onrush in the closing seconds.

A field goal by Higginbotham and a free throw just as the third quarter ended gave Crater a 49-47 edge at that point.

Palmberg opened the final frame as he dropped in a gift shot, but Higginbotham dumped in a two-pointer to give Crater a 51-48 margin with a minute gone.

Patzke slipped through underneath for two and Brickner came back 40 seconds later with another two-pointer that gave Klamath a short-lived 52-51 margin. Again Higginbotham put Crater back in the game with a field goal, but Patzke pounded in another two-pointer to give Klamath a 54-53 lead with five minutes left.

Brickner dropped in a free throw and Palmberg scored two charity tosses when fouled by Louie Alvarez and the Pels appeared to have the game with a four-point lead of 57-53 and less than four minutes to play.

But Higginbotham and company were not finished. Bryson LaCasse drove in for a lay-in and was fouled, converting the gift toss for a three-point effort, paring the lead to a single point at 57-56.

The Pels reverted to a stalling game while Crater remained with their tight well-played zone defense. Palmberg was fouled by Dennis Edwards with 1:30 left in the game and promptly converted both tosses.

However, Higginbotham, the game's top scorer with 30 points, stormed right back for two and it was still one point at 59-58.

With 45 seconds left, Palmberg made a smooth move for a clean lay-up and Fred Biehn dumped one of two free tosses when fouled by Higginbotham to wind up the scoring, giving the Pels a hard-earned 62 to 58 victory.

Widest margin in the game was a five-point spread with Klamath holding a 35-30 edge just after the third quarter opened, but it also disappeared quickly.

Higginbotham was busy both on the court and the free throw line, as he tossed in eight field goals and converted an excellent 14 out of 16 charity shots.

Brickner paced the Pel scoring with 24 points while Palmberg netted 16 and Ray Taylor 12.

The victory was the fifth conference victory for Klamath, and Coach Dean White's charges 20th win in 11 outings.

The Pelican Junior Varsity turned in a fourth quarter scoring effort in the preliminary to top the Crater JV squad 35 to 42.

Dana Ash paced the KU Jayvees with 18 points while Sherm Allen had 17. Ron Beman topped Crater Jayvee efforts with 11.

# Chiloquin Withstands Antler Attack; Merrill Huskies, SHA Trojans Win

The Bonanza Antlers came uncomfortably close to ending a County B League win string for Chiloquin Friday night but the Panthers managed to hang on and eke out a 63-57 win on the Bonanza court.

In other action around the circuit the Malin Mustangs, after leading most of the way, finally bowed 48-38 to the Merrill Huskies and the Sacred Heart Trojans had to hustle to subdue the Bly Bobcats, 48-41, on the academy floor.

In a non-counter played at Gilchrist the host Grizzlies missed numerous chances and were shaded 46-44 by the Paisley Broncos.

Chiloquin 65, Bonanza 57  
Panther Butch Crume chalked up 30 points in a fast and furious struggle at Bonanza but the Chiloquin club still came awfully close to losing their first league action.

The determined Antlers, although suffering from the loss of three first-stringers via the five foul route, were within two points of the winners with less than two minutes remaining.

In their hurry to catch up however, they broke out in a final rash of fouls that ran their total to 28 for the game and the Chiloquin crew pulled it out. The winners were charged with 22 fouls.

Bonanza lost Denny Ellis, Abe O'Connor and Henry Dearborn on fouls while the Panthers had to play without one man, a reserve.

The Antlers got away to a slim 17-16 first quarter lead but Crume heated up for a total of 12 points in the second period to give the Panthers a 40-34 halftime bulge. They kept their distance in the third which ended 54-48, but the Bonanzans roared back in the fourth.

The losers, led by Ellis who pulled in 21 rebounds, dominated the boards all the way.

Larry Albert, with 14 points, all from the field, was high for the losers while Rod Schooler was next with 13, followed by Ellis with 12.

Frank Heglund counted 13 for the number two spot for the Panthers. Crume hit 12 field goals and connected on six for 11 from the foul line.

# 1961 Angling Rules Tentatively Set

PORTLAND—Minor adjustments and rule clarifications were the main changes made in the 1961 angling regulations tentatively set by the Oregon Game Commission following a public hearing Friday, Jan. 13.

If tentative rules are given final approval on Jan. 27, the 1961 general trout season will open April 22 and extend through Oct. 31 in all zones except streams in Zones 1, 3 and 4. For streams in Zone 1 and the high lakes in the Cascades, the season would run from May 27 through Oct. 31. Exception to the high lake closing would include East and Paulina lakes, with closing date set for Oct. 8. Tributary stream closures on several high lakes would be effective in September and October to protect spawning kokanee, eastern brook and brown trout.

The fall salmon season on the Umpqua was reduced 15 days, with the season scheduled to run from Aug. 26 through Oct. 31. The bag limit, however, would allow five jack salmon from 12 to 20 inches to be taken during the fall season. Other regulations on the Umpqua remained the same as last year, except date adjustments for weekend openings.

Regulations affecting Rogue River anglers included a reduction in the salmon possession limit from five to four to conform to the possession limit in the rest of the state.

Final regulations for the 1961 seasons will be set by the commission Friday, Jan. 27. The public hearing is scheduled to convene at 10 a.m. at the commission's Portland office, 1634 S.W. Alder.

Following are changes in the rules tentatively established for 1961:  
Open seasons: April 22 to Oct. 31 in all zones except streams in Zones 1, 3 and 4.  
May 27 to Oct. 31 for streams in Zone 1 and for lakes, reservoirs and their tributaries within national forest boundaries in the Cascade mountains. (See exceptions.) East, Paulina, and Sparks lakes, May 27 to Oct. 8.  
Use of bait: Dead fish or parts thereof may be used in waters of Zone 1.

Bullfrogs: Night angling allowed for bullfrogs.  
Closed areas: With the exception of Lyons Bar and the Sauvie Island game management area is closed to all fishing during the waterfowl season.

Bullheads and channel catfish: Bag limit, 109 fish in the aggregate but not more than 50 pounds per day or in possession.

Zone I  
Description of Zone 1: All waters west of the crest of the Coast range (exclusive of the Rogue and Umpqua drainages) including those tributaries of the Columbia below the city of St. Helens.

Big Creek (Lincoln County): Opened to angling.  
Hunters Creek (Curry County): From a point 200 feet below to a point 200 feet above old Highway 101 bridge closed to all angling, except from May 28 to Aug. 31.

Mercer Lake: Open to angling entire year (summer trout bag limit).  
Triangle Lake: Open to angling entire year (summer trout bag limit).

Wilson River: Above Mills Bridge closed to salmon angling April 1 to Oct. 31. Below Mills Bridge open to salmon angling April 22 to Oct. 31. (See winter regulations.) Wilson River open to trout eight inches and over up to Lees Bridge July 8 to Oct. 31.

Zone II  
Clackamas River: Closed to all angling from River Mill Dam downstream to the gauging station April 15 to Oct. 31.  
Dorena Reservoir and Row River: Between the reservoir and the county bridge upstream open to angling entire year (summer bag limit).

Fish Lake (Linn County): Closed to angling.  
Gold Lake: Open to angling June 10 to Oct. 31.  
Hidden Lake (Lane County): Tributaries closed to angling.

including one-fourth mile of outlet.  
Willamette River: Closed to angling from a point 200 feet above the fishway at Oregon City Falls to a line below the falls from the southwest corner of the electric plant on Black Point to the north end of the steel bridge on the west side of the river just below the Crown Zellerbach tailrace.

Zone III  
Diamond Lake: Bait angling from an anchored boat prohibited on Diamond Lake.  
Umpqua River: Salmon regulations, Main Umpqua, North Umpqua below narrows at Rock Creek, South Umpqua below Jackson Creek, and Smith River below West Fork, Aug. 26 to Oct. 31. Bag limit, two fish over 20 inches and five fish 12 to 20 inches. Possession limit, four fish over 20 inches and 10 fish 12 to 20 inches.

Zone IV  
Applegate River: Winter regulations, exclusive of tributaries open to winter angling below the Murphy Bridge Jan. 13 to Feb. 28.  
Rogue River: Salmon bag limit, two fish over 20 inches plus four fish 15 to 20 inches. Possession limit, four fish over 20 inches plus eight fish 15 to 20 inches.

Zone V  
Cultus River: Tributary to Crane Prairie Reservoir closed to all angling Oct. 1.  
Deschutes River: Closed to all angling from Crane Prairie Dam downstream to Sheep Bridge Forest Camp, a distance of about two miles, except that after Sept. 5 to Oct. 31 the closure will extend to a point one-fourth mile below Sheep Bridge Forest Camp.  
Lucky Lake: Opened to angling.  
Mud Lake: Opened to angling.
