consecutive years of aerial reforestation, we have reseeded a total of about 7,000 acres in the Smith River and Lower Umpqua Tree Farms. Earlier in 1960, as part of the company's reforestation plan in the Gardiner-Reed sport area, a large aerial spraying project cleared growth-restricting brush from the land for this winter's aerial seeding.

In the Vaughn Tree Farm, approximately 20 miles west of Eugene, the company has finished its second year of aerial reforestation. Some 600,000 Douglas fir seedlings have also been hand planted in the Vaughn woods in the last few years.

An innovation facilitated the seeding of IP lands. The "copters" were outfitted with a hollow pipe-like seed-spreading device called a slinger. Formerly, a "copter" seeding outlet consisted of a rotating vented disc under the helicopter.

There are several advantages of the new seed spreading apparatus, which enhances uniform seed distribution on the ground, eliminating seed "skips." The whirling slinger's long arms propel seeds in 150-foot-wide swaths, affording some 50 per cent greater coverage than the shorter-ranged disc. This wider seeding pattern provides greater seed overlap when the "copter" crosses the seeding area.

Another advantage of the slinger is that possibility of seed damage during dissemination is eliminated, which increases seed germination potential. A check on proper seed flow is assured through the new location of the slinger in front of the helicopter in full view of the pilot.

About 100 pounds of seed per load was carried by the helicopters with the seed filtering from fiberglas hoppers through a metering device into the seed-spreading slinger. The precise seed dissemination system controls the poundage of seed uniformly distributed per acre at the "copter's" average seeding speed of 45 m.p.h. Douglas fir aerial seeding normally averages one-half to one pound of seed per acre.

Each IP tree farm was flown in two to three days with the exception of Vernonia and Ryderwood where mid-winter fog and winds created flying delays. An average of 1,000 acres a day were seeded at the rate of two minutes per eight acres, including cross-fly seeding.

As a result of the extensive seeding projects, thousands of new young trees will be born this spring on IP's western tree farms after temperature and moisture changes help the seeds germinate.

Guiding the Long-Bell reforestation program is A. J. Sandoz, manager of IP's Western Timber Department.

All International Paper aerial seeding this winter was done by Perpetual Forests Inc., with this organization's vice presidents John Cameron and Bent Gerdes working with IP branch foresters in supervising the seeding projects. The actual helicopter seeding was performed by two veteran reforestation "copter" pilots, Dale Kaponen of Whidby Island, Wash., and R. E. McCarthy of Yakima,

Tenants Change But White House Help Keep Jobs

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Butlers, maids, cooks, doormen and bottle washers at the White House generally keep their jobs even though First Families come and go.

Some of those on the domestic staff of 25 have been in their present posts since the days when Franklin D. Roosevelt presided in the executive mansion.

Chief Usher J. B. West, the manager of the domestics, maintenance men and gardeners at 1600 Pennsylvania Ave., says that traditionally there is not much turnover during a shift in administrations.

But this matter is left entirely to Mrs. John F. Kennedy, the incoming first lady. The White House help is exempted from civil service job-protection regulations.

However, no occupants of the many-pillared mansion want to be without experienced servants to help welcome visiting royalty and heads of state in style.

"It takes years just to learn how to open the front door," said one veteran who has had a close look at White House doings under the Eisenhower administration.

West, who became chief usher in 1956, has served 20 years in the usher's office. He said there are five butlers, five maids, three cooks, two kitchen helpers, five housemen and five doormen on the White House domestic staff.

Each one works a 40-hour week and that is why it's necessary to have three cooks, West explained. The President and his wife traditionally bring in their own personal servants—maid and valet. In the Kennedys' case, they probably will bring along a governess for 3-year-old Caroline and a nurse for young John F. Jr.

A list of trained waiters, butlers, pantrymen and kitchen assistants is kept handy for state dinners or other occasions when extra help is necessary.

For a dinner of 100, for example, an additional 10 or 12 servants would be hired.
