KUHS Choir, Ensemble Are Invited To Music Educators' Conference

The Klamath Union High School A Cappella Choir and string ensemble have received an invitation to make five appearances at the Northwest divisional meeting of the National Music Educators' Conference at Spokane March 15 through 18.

"This is a signal honor for the youngsters," said M. Dale Hallack, director of vocal music in city schools. "Invitations are extended only to groups applying before Dec. 1 with submission of recordings, list of previous achievement, photographs and other qualifications."

Fewer than 20 of more than 100 applications were accepted, said Dr. Frank D'Andrea, conference president.

The choir and strings were invited to perform during one of the concert hours, and thus are entitled to further honor, since the spots are considered premium.

Dr. D'Andrea is head of the music department at Washington State University.

Hallack, director of the choir and strings, says the Madrigal Singers, 20 select voices from the choir, and the string ensemble have been invited to perform during the conference.

WITHOUT CHIEF

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Technically speaking, the United States was without a president for 51 minutes Friday.

Under the 20th Amendment to the Constitution, President Eisenhower's term ended and President Kennedy's began promptly at noon EST.

But the inaugural ceremonies ran behind schedule and Kennedy didn't actually take the oath of office until 12:51 p.m.

The hiatus is not unusual. It happens at every inauguration of a new president, and the republic has always survived it.

Ponti seeks annulment on the grounds that his proxy marriage to the Italian movie star Sept. 17, 1957, is ineffective due to lack of sufficient witnesses to the ceremony.

Gulley Defends 'Selfish Interest'

Problems in human understanding on the local and international level were the topic of a talk Friday to the Klamath Falls Rotary Club by Emmett Gulley, Portland. Gulley is a representative of the American Friends Service Commission.

Gulley related his experiences in dealing with 235,000 Arab refugees in 1948, when he headed a relief commission near Palestine. Included among the refugees were 70,000 children of school age. Gulley's commission had the responsibility of housing, clothing, feeding and educating the hundreds of thousands of refugees who streamed into the camp, operated by the British. At the start the only facilities were tents, heat, sanitation, medical facilities had to be provided almost overnight for the swarm of humanity.

At one time, during this period, Gulley had the opportunity to talk with Egypt premier Gamal Nasser, who at that time,

was a captain in the Egyptian army. Nasser predicted to Gulley that the Arabs would drive all of the Jews out of Egypt.

Gulley warned that the United States must be "selfishly interested" in every remote country in the world. He stated that the Middle East and African situations are such that World War III could be touched off momentarily.

Gulley spoke briefly on the Klamath Reservation termination problem. He charged Rotarians and others in the community to lend their energies and resources to helping make the termination a continuing orderly process. He said that frustration and fear

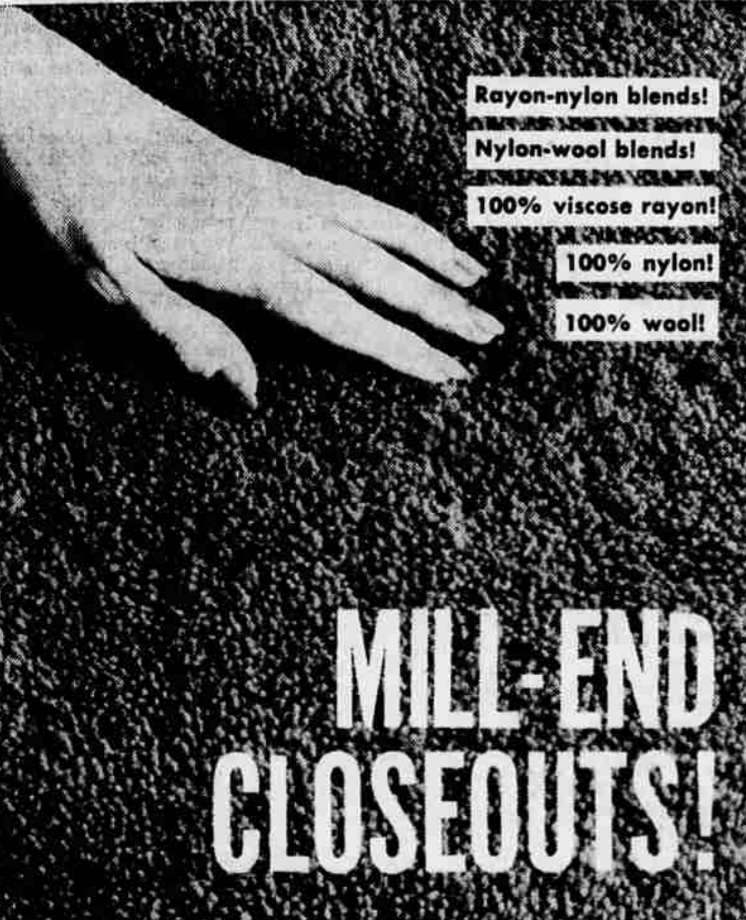
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
