Owls, Raiders In Rematch

The Oregon Tech Owls, still savoring the taste of a sweet 58-47 victory over the Southern Oregon Red Raiders a week ago, move on the Raider court tonight at 8 o'clock to tangle with the stumbling SOC quintet for the second of their annual four games.

After the win over their pet enemies last Tuesday the Techmen got a weekend off but things just got worse for coach Ted Schopf's Raiders. They were handed a pair of humiliating defeats by the Portland State Vikings who took over the Oregon Collegiate Conference lead.

Upon their return from Ashland tonight the Owls settle into preparations for a two-game session with the Oregon College Wolves Friday and Saturday. The Friday game will be played at 8 p.m. in the Oregon Tech gym while the Saturday tilt is slated to start at 1:30 in the afternoon.

OTI coach Wally Palmberg suggested the afternoon game to OCE officials in order to avoid a conflict with the Klamath Union-Medford game at KU Saturday night. The Wolves agreed to the strange game time.

Palmberg plans to go with the same starting five which proved so effective against the Raiders last week. Starting at center will be Sammy Smith, at forwards, Bob Cumford and Bob Petersen, while Norm Johns and freshman Larry Hodgen will handle the guard assignments.

Standing by as able reserve strength will be Leon Wilson, Hewlett Nash and another freshman, Dave Horn.

Also seen as a possible for action tonight is big game Branson who the 6-4 veteran forward, who is reportedly shaking off the after-effects of a nasty knee injury.

Branson has been able to work out with the squad for the past few days but is still favoring the knee to a certain extent.

The Raiders have been endeavoring to find a combination that can once again instill some "go" in their offense.

Young Jerry Shultz, a promising freshman just up from the Medford Black Tornado, scored 20 points for the Raiders in the second Portland State game and will probably move into a starting slot tonight.

The remainder of the lineup will include John Payne, 6-5, Gordie Carrigan, 5-11, Don Vannice, 6-1, and either Dave Grader, Dave Hughes or Earle Tichenor.

Although the Raiders, in so far as games with the Techmen are concerned, rate an edge on their home court, their three straight losses make tonight's game a toss-up.

Scribe Lauds D'Amato

Third Heavy Title Fight Silly, But Proves Manager's Ability

The most useless thing ever invented in sports is the third heavyweight title bout between Floyd Patterson and Ingemar Johansson, currently scheduled — subject to the whims of Cus D'Amato and the vagaries of bumbling promoters — for Miami March 13.

The only thing the silly series proves is that, whether or not you like his ways, Cus D'Amato is one of the most effective managers the boxing business has ever known — from the standpoint of his fighter, which is the only fair way to evaluate the pilot of a pug.

D'Amato has protected Patterson with the ferocity of a mama bear and coddled him like little Lord Fauntleroy while steering him to the title twice with an absolute minimum of personal jeopardy. And that's the rub — Patterson hasn't fought anybody.

The only ranking heavyweight the champion engaged, before his inexplicable knockout of Archie Moore in an elimination to determine the successor to Rocky Marciano, was Tommy (Hurricane) Jackson. A flashy fighter at the time, Jackson won the vote of one arbiter but Patterson got the decision and most of the money.

Patterson's first title defense was against Jackson but by then Tommy, having gone the way of all flesh, was stopped in 10. While such proven heavyweights as Eddie Machen, Zora Foley, Nino Valdes (yes, Valdes) and others who could have tested Patterson were being shunned as though they were by a Juke out of Typhoid Mary, the champion was having a field day with a hand-picked Percival Popovers.

He got good money for disposing of the likes of Pete Rademacher, a lumbering amateur making his professional debut; inept Roy Harris, and Brian London, especially imported from Britain to serve as the highest-priced sparring partner in history

Rademacher Gets Verdict

SEATTLE (AP) — Pete Rademacher, 202, won a unanimous 10-round decision Monday night over Donnie Fleeman, 185, Midlothian, Tex.

For Rademacher, of Columbus, Ga., it was the 12th victory in 16 fights.

It was the winner's first appearance in Seattle since he began his professional career in a 6-round knockout loss to world champion Floyd Patterson in 1957.

Rademacher moved around better Monday night. He also put up a better defense and had an opponent who wasn't as tough as Patterson.

Viking Player Stock Plan Causes Rift

NEW YORK (AP)—The National Football League meeting got under way today with the owners split into two factions on ways and means of stocking the new Minnesota Vikings.

One group wants to limit the number of players to be put up for grabs by Coach Norm Van Brocklin of the Vikings.

This faction points out that the Vikings already have been permitted to participate in the draft (they picked up 20 players), and have signed a pretty good quarterback in George Shaw.

The other group wants to give the Vikings the full list of 11 players to choose from—the same number the Dallas Cowboys picked from last season when they began operations. A spokesman for this group pointed out that even with the wide choice, the Cowboys didn't win a game.

"I think the Vikings should get the same break as the Cowboys," said Commissioner Pete Rozelle before entering the meeting. At any rate, the Vikings will wind up with 36 players, three from each team except the Cowboys.

It also seemed certain that the league will vote to expand its schedule from 12 to 14 games. All concerned agreed that it won't be easy, but that it is a necessity. Part of the solution will be to cut the exhibition season to five games and open on the weekend of Sept. 15.

"We'll have the problem of base-

ball at one end and weather at the other," Rozelle said.

Five of the Eastern and four of the Western Conference teams play their games in baseball parks. That makes for a scheduling problem. Furthermore, only Los Angeles, San Francisco and Dallas are reasonably certain of good weather late in the season.

"Right now," observed Jack Mara, president of the New York Giants, "the ball parks aren't available for a 14-game schedule."

On the other hand, Washington Redskins' owner George Preston Marshall said he has been signing players on the assumption that they will play 14 regular season games.

"Besides," he said, "the other league (the AFL) plays a 14-game schedule and we can't afford to continue paying these high salaries unless we have more revenue."

Under the new alignment, Dallas (a swing team last year), probably will go in the Eastern section and Minnesota in the Western. Each conference will play an entire home-and-home schedule; plus two games with members of the other division.

Another matter that was scheduled to get considerable attention was the matter of television. Rozelle wants to negotiate a package deal such as the AFL has. The NFL clubs make their own individual TV arrangements.

Top-Ranked Pels Face Rough Duty

Three Southern Oregon powers remain at the top of the Associated Press state high school basketball poll this week.

Again Klamath Falls is ranked No. 1. Roseburg, which split a pair of early season games with Klamath Falls, picked up stronger backing this week. Three of the sports writers and broadcasters who voted preferred Roseburg, which has the state's high scorer in Jim Jarvis.

The other eleven stuck with Klamath Falls.

Klamath Falls will again draw the state prep spotlight when the Medford quintet invades the Pelican home-ground Saturday night for their second match of the season. The first meeting resulted in a slim 58-56 overtime victory for the Pelicans at Medford.

The Pelicans travel to Grants Pass Friday night for a second game with the Cavemen whom they defeated 69-52 at Klamath Falls the first time around.

In other Southern Oregon Conference action on the weekend, the Crater Comets meet the Grizzlies in Ashland Friday while Medford draws a bye. Saturday Grants Pass is at Crater while the Ashlanders rest.

Defending state champion Medford again was a strong third. Unbeaten Grant, the Portland leader, advanced from fifth to No. 4, changing places with South Eugene, which dropped a 72-71 contest to Marshfield.

Wilson of Portland, with a two-point loss to Grant the only blemish on its record, stayed No. 6. La Grande, which appears the strongest northeastern Oregon team with a 14-0 season mark, held to seventh place.

Marshfield moved into the select group, taking No. 8. Beaverton, which held that spot last week, fell from the top 10 despite a victory over Centennial of Gresham.

Corvallis held to ninth place, and Bend, after weekend victories over Pendleton and Hermiston, reclaimed No. 10 spot from David Douglas of Portland, which was upset by Astoria.

Pro-Amateur Pairings Set For Tourney

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — That well-known amateur golfer, Bing Crosby, who has a number of other sidelines, is paired with professional Doug Sanders, Cedarhurst, Ga., in Wednesday's opening rounds of the San Francisco International Pro-Amateur Tournament.

Pairings were announced after 42 pros and four amateurs completed qualifying rounds Monday at Harding Park and Lake Merced golf courses.

The \$5,000 pro-amateur tournament Wednesday is a prelude to the pro rounds Thursday through Sunday. Prize money totals \$57,000.

Ken Still, 25, Tacoma, Wash., a newcomer to the pro ranks, led the qualifiers with a 3-under-par 69 over the Harding Park course.

Crosby came to San Francisco from Pebble Beach where his 20th annual \$50,000 Crosby Open ended Sunday in a victory for Bob Rosburg of Palo Alto, Calif. Rosburg is teamed with Bob Ross Jr., San Francisco, in the San Francisco tournament.

For his outstanding feats in winning the Masters and the U.S. Open and topping the money winners with a record \$80,378, among other notable achievements, Palmer emerged as the decisive winner of the S. Rae Hickok Pro Athlete of the Year award.

The Latrobe, Pa., golfer beat a formidable field, including heavyweight boxing champion Floyd Patterson, quarterback Norm Van Brocklin of the NFL, champion Philadelphia Eagles, and Pittsburgh World Series heroes Bill Mazeroski and Vernon Law.

Palmer received 73 first place votes from the nationwide panel of 145 sports writers and sportscasters and 302 points on a 3-2-1 basis. Patterson got 35 first place and 196 points. Van Brocklin's score was 19 first places and 176 points to 41 and 53 for Mazeroski and 5 and 35 for Law.

Ohio State rolled to its 13th straight Saturday by downing Minnesota 75-56. Their only game this week is the Saturday matinee regional TV date with Purdue.

St. Bonaventure and Bradley are still follow Ohio State in the same order. The Bonnies boosted their record to 14-1 by thumping Canisius in their only start last week.

Swim, Grid Stars Feted At Banquet

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—A host of sports celebrities were on hand Saturday night to honor swimming's Jeff Farrell and football's Norm Van Brocklin and Mike Ditka.

The occasion was the 57th anniversary banquet of the Philadelphia Sports Writers Association.

Farrell flew here from France, where he is studying for a post with the U.S. Foreign Service, to receive the award as the most courageous athlete of 1960.

The 23-year-old Kansan who swam at the University of Oklahoma and Yale won two gold medals in the 400 and 800 meter relays in the Olympics last summer, despite an emergency appendectomy six nights before the tryouts in Detroit. He refused to take a free berth on the Olympic swimming team, but instead earned it after working out in a pool with his side heavily taped.

The 34-year-old Van Brocklin, the new coach of the Minnesota Vikings who quarterbacked the Philadelphia Eagles to the National Football League title last year in his last season as a player, was given a plaque as the outstanding athlete of the year.

Ditka, an All-American end at Pitt who has signed with the Chicago Bears after being their No. 1 draft choice, was cited as the college football lineman of the year.

Negro Stars, Resentful, Says Writer

CHICAGO (AP) — Chicago's American says Negro major league baseball players are becoming resentful over embarrassments and humiliation in Southern training camps.

In a copyrighted article by Wendell Smith Monday, the paper said such players as Ernie Banks of the Chicago Cubs, Willie Mays of San Francisco and Hank Aaron of Milwaukee are idolized by thousands of youngsters across the nation, are accepted as first class citizens in the North during the regular season but as second class citizens during spring training.

The American said Negro players resent not being allowed to stay in the same hotels with their teammates and not being able to eat in the same restaurants.

Smith, a Negro, said Chicago Cub Negro players will be accepted along with the other players at the hotel where the team stays in Mesa, Ariz. Such is not the case with the Chicago White Sox who train in Sarasota, Fla.

Negro players on the Sox, says Smith, will not be able to stay with their teammates. "They will have to stay in a Negro community under conditions that leave something to be desired," he wrote.

OGC Plants Porky Foe

The Oregon Game Commission is attempting to return to Oregon woods a natural enemy of the porcupine.

The little mammal is known as the fisher. Biologists say it is one of few animals that is able to eat a porcupine without being stuck by its quills.

The porcupine has become a serious problem to foresters because it eats tree seedlings.

Eleven of the fishers were trapped in British Columbia and set loose in the Mountain Lakes Wildlife Area of the Rogue River National Forest.

The region once was the natural home of the fisher. But it was exterminated by trappers seeking its valuable pelt. The Game Commission said that it hopes fishers again will populate the woods and become abundant enough to allow resumption of trapping.

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
