## New Beaver Coach Is T Specialist

CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP)—Oregon State College today gave impetus to its plans for a multiple football offense by naming a new assistant coach, Bob Gambold, a T-formation specialist who quit as an assistant at Washington State University last month.

Ray S. Keene, athletic director at Oregon State, said Gambold will join the staff at once as a top assistant to head coach Tommy Prothro, who disclosed earlier this week that OSC will add a T-formation attack to the single wing it has used for years.

Gambold was an outstanding quarterback for Washington State from 1948 through 1950. He then played with the Chicago Cardinals and the Philadelphia Eagles of the National Football League before returning to Washington State as an assistant coach in 1956. He attended high school at Longview, Wash.

In announcing plans for the multiple offense, Prothro said: "We have some backs who seem especially fitted for the T-formation and we will have a more diversified offense."

One of those backs, he said, is Terry Baker, a T-quarterback in high school who became one of the nation's leading gainers as a sophomore tailback in the single wing this year. OSC also has another top tailback, Don Kasso, who alternated with Baker last season. In a T-formation, they could be in the backfield at the same time, Baker as the quarterback, Kasso as a halfback.

## Rams Trade Billy Wade

NEW YORK (AP)—Billy Wade, veteran Los Angeles quarterback who didn't like the Rams' way of doing things, Saturday was traded to the Chicago Bears as part of a three-way National Football League deal.

The Rams got defensive halfback Eric Barnes from the Bears, then immediately swapped him to the New York Giants for defensive halfback Linden Crow, an ex-Southern California player.

The Giants also got guard John Guzik from the Rams and their No. 3 draft choice for 1961. The Giants gave up their No. 1 draft choice to the Rams, but they'll still have a first pick which they acquired previously from the new Minnesota Vikings in a deal for quarterback George Shaw.

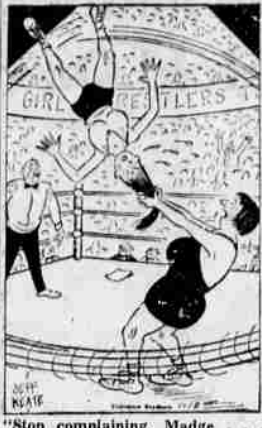
## Young Pels Top Visitors

## Olympic Heroine Honored

On the red clay Olympic track at Rome last summer, long-legged Wilma Rudolph ran away from all opponents and won three Olympic gold medals with almost ridiculous ease.

Saturday she outdistanced the opposition just as easily as female athlete of the year for 1960 in the annual Associated Press year-end poll.

In the voting by 129 sports writers and broadcasters throughout the United States, Miss Rudolph's name appeared first on all but 14 ballots.

In the tabulation on a 3-2-1 basis for first, second and third place votes it was no contest. Wilma received 365 points. Chris Von Saltza, another winner of three Olympic gold medals, was second with 126 points. World and Olympic figure skating champion Carol Heiss—now Mrs. Hayes Alan Jenkins—was third with 101.

Miss Rudolph succeeds Maria Bueno of Brazil, 1959 winner of the Wimbledon and U.S. tennis championships, in the role of outstanding woman athlete of the year. In recognition of her feats, Miss Rudolph will receive the Frederic C. Miller Memorial Trophy, given by the Fraternal Order of Eagles at a civic luncheon in Milwaukee Feb. 27.

MONMOUTH (Special)—The Oregon College wrestling team, led by 3-time NAAIA district champion Tony Cutsforth and Francis Tressler, an able 167-pounder, dealt the Oregon Tech Owls their first defeat of the season, 24-6, here Friday night.

The matches were much closer than the score indicated. Cutsforth, one of the best 147-pounders on the coast, had nothing but trouble with Oregon Tech's Lyle Thompson until he finally nailed him to the mat in the final round for a pin. Thompson, a former 155-pounder who dropped to 147 within one week, just ran out of gas because of his rapid drop in weight.

Tressler, who also won by a pin, proved much more than OTI's Tomas Gilman could handle. Tressler gained his victory in 1:17 of the first round.

The Techmen won two matches. John Weaver and Dave Kubesh turning in outstanding performances for the Techmen. Hank Williams, 157, and neophyte heavyweight Ed Anderson, both of whom have shown tremendous improvement, lost narrow decisions.

The Oregon Tech Owls made a clean sweep of their weekend series with the Oregon College Wolves by earning a hard-way 70-64 win in the OTI gym Saturday afternoon after taking a ragged 78-65 victory Friday night.

Saturday the Owls proved to themselves that they could get up from a nine-point deficit showing with 10 minutes left in the ball game and also that they can win without the "big" man when it's a must.

Doing without the "big" man became a real serious must Saturday.

With 17 minutes left in the game, the Owls won 70-64.
