Patzke's 21 Paces Conference Win

GRANTS PASS (Special)—The Cavemen lost their battle for survival Friday night.

Three of the big guns in the KUHS arsenal found the range for double figures and despite a strong last minute rally, scuttled the Grants Pass hopes of staying in contention in the Southern Oregon Conference by pacing the Pels to a 58 to 52 triumph at Grants Pass.

Gary Patzke was top scorer for the game as he dropped in six field goals and converted nine of his 14 gift shot attempts for 21 points. Teammate Bruce

The Pels converted only 22 of 42 free throw attempts while the losers scored 12 of 19.

Larry Janssen jumped the home-standing Cavemen into the lead when the game was 35 seconds old with a two-pointer. Patzke came back 43 seconds later to knot the count at 2-2, but Janssen added another field goal 30 seconds later to break the tie.

That's the way the ball game went, with the lead see-sawing, finally being deadlocked at 10-all and 12-all.

A field goal by Palmberg and a free shot by Bricker made the count 16 to 13, but as the first quarter closed, Lee Burton converted two free throws for Grants Pass to make the first quarter lead 16-15 for Klamath Falls.

At half-time the Pelicans held a four-point lead at 26-22, and in the third frame they jumped into their biggest lead as they ballooned the count to 38-28 and later 44-34.

After the third quarter ended with KU in front by a nine-point margin at 46-37, the Cavemen began to battle back in a desperate attempt to turn the tide.

Dave Hantz slipped in for one from underneath, and Jim Blacksmith hit from the outside to pair it down to 45-41. Patzke added a free throw for Klamath, but Hantz again counted two for Grants Pass and the score stood at 47-43 with six minutes left in the final stanza.

Palmberg made one of two charity tosses, but Clyde Murray scored on a two-bander to pull the Cavemen to within three points at 48-45 with five minutes left.

Palmer added two more free throws and Patzke dropped in a two pointer to stretch the lead to 52-45 midway in the quarter.
