

Sweet Adelines Issue Invitation

Much interest has in the past few years been shown in the Sweet Adeline singing group that has performed at many local affairs. At this time, in view of the coming barbershop parade scheduled for April, the members invite all women interested in four-part harmony, barbershop style, to attend their next meeting on Tuesday, Jan. 31, starting at eight o'clock in the Willard Hotel.

Sweet Adelines, Inc. is a group of women barbershop harmony singers that is independent from SPEBSQSA, national men's barbershop organization. The lady songbirds were incorporated in 1945 at Tulsa, Okla., by nine women. Their unique idea spread nationwide and at the present time there are 14 regions in the United States and Canada with a membership of 8,000.

Klamath Falls Crater Lake Chapter received its charter in November, 1947, and was the 15th chapter to join Region 13. This region has 24 chapters in Washington, Oregon, Montana and the Canadian provinces of Saskatchewan, British Columbia and Alberta.

Region 13 has doubled in size since originated in 1954 with six prospective chapters to be organized.

The primary function of Sweet Adelines is to teach and train women of all ages in the singing of a barbershop style, four-part harmony. It is non-profit and is neither an auxiliary of nor associated with any other organization. Its national theme and song is "Harmonize the World." Its code of ethics reads: "Organization of women to seek recreation and relaxation by uniting to enjoy harmony in singing the old songs barbershop style."

In today's mail is a letter from a reader who feels guilty because she has been less than frank with her husband in money matters. For years, she says, she has had secret charge accounts which have nearly driven her crazy. She has to stretch her household allowance to pay a little on that one.

This has come about, she says, because she dreaded the long discussions that always followed when she asked her husband for money for this or that special purchase. Her feelings of guilt are understandable — but she certainly shouldn't feel alone in her deception. There may not be a lot of women who have charge accounts their husbands don't know exist.

But an awful lot of wives do mighty fancy juggling of household money, rather than tell their husbands exactly what they spent for a hat, a new sofa, or a party dress.

It isn't that they are married to skinflints, either. Most of them aren't. Then why do they feel they have to do all that financial juggling?

One reason is probably that they think a man wouldn't understand the necessity for some of the things they buy. What looks "perfectly all right" to a man often looks out-of-date or absolutely hopeless to a woman. Another woman would understand perfectly—but would a man?

The other reason is that the clothes, furniture, and knick-knacks a woman's heart yearns for are often so expensive that her common sense tells her they are more than she can afford.

She expects her husband to be bowled over by the price, because she herself thinks it is unreasonable. But still she wants what she wants and so she begins to figure how he might manage to "finance" it, without coming right out and asking for the money. Perhaps, the best way for wives to avoid the temptation to be less than frank about money matters is to take their husbands with them when they shop. Men who habitually shop with their wives don't have to be hoodwinked about price tags.
