Former Pro Claims Golf Too Easy

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — George Schneider, former PGA tournament director and one-time touring pro, said today that the game of golf is too easy—and that the way to make it tougher is to reduce the size of the cups on the greens.

"I know this proposal will bring howls of protest," said Schneider, now a semi-retired Montana moneybags. "But I hear all this talk about making golf cups bigger to speed up the play. I think that's going in the wrong direction. I believe the day will come when the size of the cups will be cut from the present standard of four and one-half inches to a maximum of three inches."

From Maine to Florida and Minnesota to California there'll be bitter denunciations of the proposal—but it does have merit, Schneider explains it this way: Only Answer "The compression on golf balls has been standardized and the pros and amateurs alike still hit the ball out of sight. The greens are as smooth as glass. This makes the courses too easy for most of the better players."

LA Hurler's '6 Contract Biggest Yet

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Big Don Drysdale received his reward today for being the strike-out king of the National League, a contract from the Los Angeles Dodgers for an estimated \$33,000 that makes him the highest paid pitcher in the club's history.

Vice President and General Manager E. J. (Buzzie) Bavasi confirmed that Drysdale's 1961 contract called for "more than the \$30,000 paid Don Newcombe in 1957." Newcombe had been the highest paid pitcher that year after winning 27 games the previous season.

Drysdale was believed to have been given a raise of around \$8,000 despite a 15-14 record in 1960. Bavasi said he took into consideration the fact that Drysdale left six games with the Dodgers leading but did not receive credit for the victories that would have made him a 21-game winner.

Drysdale settled in the same neighborhood, and the \$33,000 contract he signed with the Los Angeles Dodgers represented an \$8,000 boost that makes him the highest-paid pitcher in the club's history.

Maris RBI Leader Maris, the American League's most valuable player last season, earned his raise by leading the league with 112 runs batted in while hitting 39 homers and batting .283.

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'Roadblock' To Be Back With Giants

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Sherman (Roadblock) Jones, Giants bullpen specialist, was in the fold of the San Francisco Giants today after inking his 1961 contract.

Another relief hurler, Ray DeWalt, also signed his contract with the Giants Monday.

Jones won 10 in a row last year for Tacoma of the Pacific Coast League and then came up to the parent Giants in August. He compiled a 1-1 record.

DeWalt hurled for Harlingen, pennant winners of the Texas League last year. He compiled an excellent 13-5 record for Harlingen and had an earned run average of 2.75.

The Giants announced that three minor leaguers have been invited to spring training with San Francisco. They are Harlingen outfielder Manuel Mota, Tacoma catcher Tom Haller and Georges Maranda, who pitched for the Giants last season, but is currently on the Tacoma roster.

PITTSBURGH (UPI) — Branch Rickey Jr., director of Pittsburgh Pirate farm clubs, was reported somewhat improved today from a diabetic condition with which he has been hospitalized for six days.

Dr. Joseph Finegold, Pirate team physician, said he was encouraged by Rickey's improvement. Rickey has been undergoing treatment in Presbyterian Hospital for diabetes for which he has suffered for several years.

Angels Sign Farm Club

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — The Los Angeles Angels today had a place to send prospective stars as a result of signing their first working agreement with a farm club, the Dallas-Fort Worth Rangers of the American Association.

The New American League club closed the deal for a tieup with the triple-A baseball team after conferences with Los Angeles General Manager Fred Haney and Ray Johnston of the Texas team.

"This gives us an excellent place to send some of our top prospects," Haney commented. "We consider it an excellent start toward building a farm system."

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Hot Walkers Slate Vote ARCADIA (UPI) — Grooms and "hot walkers" at Santa Anita Race Track will meet Wednesday or Thursday to vote on whether to join the Teamsters Union.

He said the union would seek a minimum wage of \$325 monthly for grooms and \$220 monthly for walkers as well as a health and welfare program and one day off a week. They now work seven days a week and grooms average about \$300.

Shasta Angler Fights Salmon

MOUNT SHASTA — Vince Galletti, Mount Shasta businessman and Ski Bowl director, is nursing a stiff, sore, and almost crippled right hand, but his family had salmon for Friday's dinner, despite difficulties.

While fishing in Sacramento River near Redding, Vince hooked what proved to be an 18-pound, fresh run Chinook salmon. With 200 yards of good line, the angler decided to "play the fish." But with more than 150 yards out, his reel handle came off. The only way to retrieve the line and land the fish was to grip a small protruding rim of the reel with his fingertips, and bring in the line against a fighting fish. Nine minutes later he had accomplished the almost impossible.
