

Camp Fire Girls Thank The Community

Camp Fire Girls observed their "Thank the Community Day" last Tuesday evening by paying tribute to individuals and groups which have contributed time, talent, energy and service to the organization.

During the annual meeting at First Presbyterian Church, Frank Drew, retiring Klamath Council president, was presented the Luther Halsey Gulick Award—the highest national Camp Fire Girls symbol of recognition for outstanding service to a local CFG program.

Drew has been a member of the council board of directors for six years. He has devoted a great deal of time to help finance and develop the camping program.

His interest and efforts in the camping program have been to help secure additional land for Camp Ka-Est-A, the girls' summer quarters at Lake of the Woods, and development of long-range plans for modernization and redevelopment of the campsite.

Before retiring as president, Drew presented certificates of appreciation and expressed the council's thanks to those who attended the dinner, and to Don Hummel of Weyerhaeuser Company for his assistance to the local professional staff and program committee in training group leaders in identification and appreciation of trees, enabling the leaders to present the program effectively to hundreds of girls in the council.

Drew also thanked Jim O'Donahue for his personal interest in the CFG program and for his help in developing the wildlife conservation studies in the CFG Golden Jubilee conservation project called "She Cares—Do You?"

Thanks went to the news media for coverage during the year.

The Klamath County and Klamath Falls schools were represented by Mrs. Isabelle Brixner and thanked for their help in making facilities available for activities such as dad-daughter dinners, council fires and Blue Bird flyup ceremonies.

They were also thanked for the schools' cooperation in helping the agency contact girls in extending the program to as many in the area as possible.

Lyle Kellstrom, city councilman representing Klamath Falls, received thanks for cooperation of sponsoring, maintaining and extending the CFG program in that city for the past 10 years.

Darroll Frewing, representing Klamath District, Rogue River National Forest, was thanked for the district's help in developing summer camp at the lake.
