

Mint Day Scheduled By Council

Hundreds of Blue Bird and Camp Fire Girls of the Klamath Council will participate in "M Day" Saturday, Feb. 25. They hope that day to sell most of 10,000 boxes of delectable mints they have ordered to help pay for council expenses.

The girls have had such success with their product, cream mint wafers, in past years that they are ordering more of the same.

Each box sold will return eight cents to the treasury of the seller's Camp Fire group. The remaining profit will be used for council operation.

Chairman of the sale is Mrs. Tracy Taggart, a council board of directors member.

Candy sale kits with complete instructions and supplies for conducting the sale will be mailed to group leaders about Feb. 13.

The CFG office in the Melhus Building will be sale headquarters and staff members will devote full time to the operation. Girls hope to complete the sale before the spring vacation beginning March 11.

The organization is a member agency of the Klamath County United Fund, but the UF allotment was insufficient this year to allow for complete council operational expenses.

Speaker On Sweden Available

LAKEVIEW — Mary Shirley Frakes, 22, who spent 6½ months living with farm families in Sweden recently, will be available as a speaker in Lake County Feb. 22 and 23.

Any school or group in the county interested in a visit from Miss Frakes is invited to call at the county agent's office or phone WH 7-2279.

She will present her program of colored slide photographs and commentary. The program is free of charge. It is designed to acquaint the public with the Oregon International Farm Youth Exchange (IFYE) program.

She was one of four recent IFYE delegates from the state. She spent time with 12 rural families in Sweden. The ranches ranged from 400 acres to very small diversified farms. She helped with farm work, harvesting wheat, barley and potatoes, and with housework.

"Each day," says Miss Frakes, "my host and I would hurry through the housecleaning and chores, then work on a special project. I learned to do Swedish embroidery, to make sausage, which we prepared for smoking to be used at Christmas, and of course, I learned to make Swedish pastries."

She lived for awhile with the Lapps in Lapland, a portion of northern Sweden, and for a time in a fishing village. These two experiences are among those she values most, says Miss Frakes.

While living with the Lapps, she helped round up reindeer and milked them.

Miss Frakes is a native of Bend. She has nearly completed work for her bachelor of science degree in home economics at Oregon State College. She was a 4-H Club member 10 years and spent two years as a 4-H leader.
