

New Councilmen Plunge Into Duties With Zest

WEED — The city's new councilmen plunged into their duties with enthusiasm this week.

During Tuesday night's meeting, they first tabled action until March 2 on a request from Jack's TV and Radio Service for a franchise to provide cable television service to the city.

Councilmen passed an ordinance replacing the county ordinance governing food handling. The ordinance gives the county health officers supervision of sanitation factors in food handling.

They also instructed William Heidewald, city attorney, to prepare an ordinance to control subdivisions and to draw up an ordinance for city business licensing procedure to be ready for a first public reading at Thursday night's meeting.

Councilmen agreed to join in a purchasing arrangement with the county. They accepted recommendation of Robert O. Bailey, city clerk, to pass a resolution giving full support to a \$160,000 bond issue, to be decided by election March 7, for construction of sewage facilities in Shastina Sanitary District. The resolution is expected to be ready for Thursday's meeting. That meeting will begin at 7:30 p.m.

Mayor J. L. (Jack) Kersey assured residents of the South Highway area that the council will do everything in its power to bring the recent drainage runoff problem under control. The council anticipates a meeting with county officials to discuss the problem, Kersey said.

He pointed out that the situation existed before Weed was incorporated recently and that the county and subdividers of the Bel Aire housing area are responsible for the drainage situation.

Kersey also pointed out that the city's relations with the county are friendly and sound and that the county, he believes, is willing to cooperate.

The council ordered the city clerk to call for bids on city liability insurance and requested that quotations be received no later than March 1 for consideration during the March 2 council meeting.

Members of Shastina Sanitary District Board of Directors were present and they pointed out possibility of obtaining federal matching funds for construction of a new sewage disposal plant and lines if need is established by the government. The district may be able to obtain up to one third the cost of the facilities proposed, they said.

Kersey stated that only two parcels of land within the district are outside the city limits. That

Interment was in Evergreen Cemetery, Yreka, following services under direction of Upton's Mortuary, Weed.

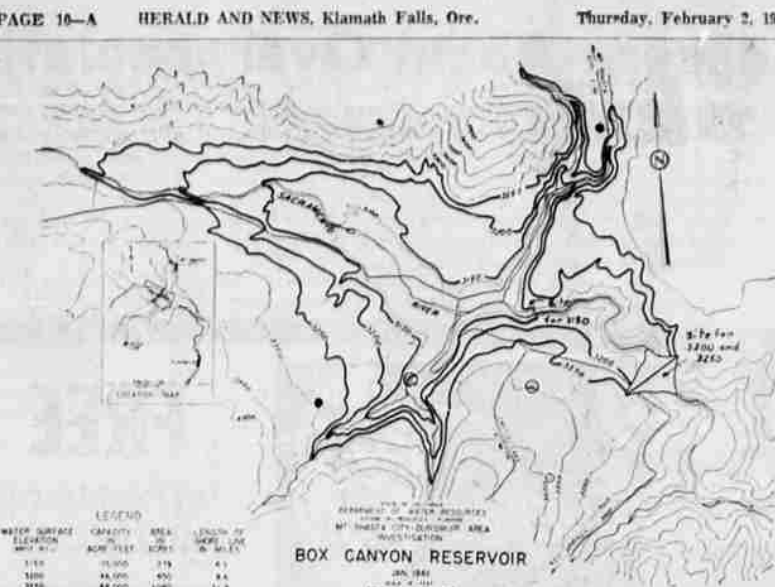

Scuffling broke out when supporters of Kenya's nationalist leader Tom Mboya heckled two speakers—Oginga Odinga and Dr. Munyua Waiyaki, who is contesting a legislative council seat against Mboya.

Solon Critical Of Commission

SACRAMENTO (UPI) — Sen. Virgil O'Sullivan, D-Williams, Tuesday criticized the Park Commission for its opinion that development of Squaw Valley was well handled.

O'Sullivan said a resolution by the commission criticizing the legislature was "unfounded and shortsighted" and placed the blame unfairly.

O'Sullivan, a member of the Senate Natural Resources Committee, differed on several points with the commission's statement.

The commission said \$8 million put into Olympic facilities could have been used on other recreational projects. O'Sullivan said the Winter Olympics could not have been held without legislative investment.

The commission said the legislature prevented the state from acquiring enough land to make the park a workable unit. O'Sullivan said "no reasonable plan has been devised which would justify expansion of park boundaries."

The commission said the legislature "dumped a hodgepodge" into the laps of state officials. O'Sullivan said the state would lose \$300,000 the first year of operation as a state park which "hardly reflects favorably on Division of Beaches and Parks execution of its responsibilities."

O'Sullivan said the passing of the commission resolution "confirmed the inability of the commission to assume responsibility within its assigned area of activities."

Yreka Council Will Get Swim Pool Plan Tonight

YREKA — Yreka City Council this evening will receive completed plans for Ringe Memorial Swimming Center, including revisions for more depth for the diving pool.

Piemme stated no major changes were necessary in the plans after they were returned from August Waegemann and Associates, consulting engineers in the Bay Area.

According to Piemme, the deeper diving pool was recommended to comply with new state requirements.

Also to be presented to the council will be an artist's conception of the completed pool and landscaped area.

It is estimated that the finished pool will cost \$94,000. Piemme pointed out that the estimate is only a guess and the actual cost will not be determined until the bids for construction are complete. He said the cost may be considerably lower.

The pool is expected to be ready for use by July 1. It will be adequate for competition swimming, first aid instruction and all-around recreation swimming. It will be complete with diving well, 25 meter swimming area and a pool for children and non-swimmers.

Tougher Narcotics Law Is Asked In Legislature

SACRAMENTO (UPI) — Atty. Gen. Stanley Mosk today called for tougher narcotics laws and abolition of the death penalty.

"My position on the death penalty has not changed," Mosk said in an exclusive interview with United Press International. He said he favored outright abolition in all cases.

He coupled his request for more narcotics rigid laws with a "word of caution" that going too far might make it difficult or impossible for local district attorneys to obtain convictions.

"I favor modification of the exclusionary rule to the extent of removing motor vehicles from the privilege which protects the home," he said. This rule excludes certain evidence—that obtained illegally—from being entered in evidence.

There is a movement in the legislature to allow any evidence, regardless of how it is obtained, to be considered in narcotics cases.

Mosk said he also supported Congressional legislation aimed at assisting states in establishing and maintaining facilities for addict treatment and favored holding a White House conference on narcotics to bring the matter to the attention of the nation.

Mosk also discussed these subjects: **Antitrust:** He has helped draft a series of bills by Assemblyman Edwin L. Z'berg, D-Sacramento, to crack down on antitrust violations.

Frauds: He plans no legislation on appliance repair frauds because "if fraud is being committed it's a crime today."

Vagrancy: He helped draft and will support a bill to punish "specific acts" rather than status in such cases as "common drunk" and "common prostitute."

Records: He favors legislation to assure that state criminal records show final disposition of cases to prevent casting a cloud on a man later freed of charges.
