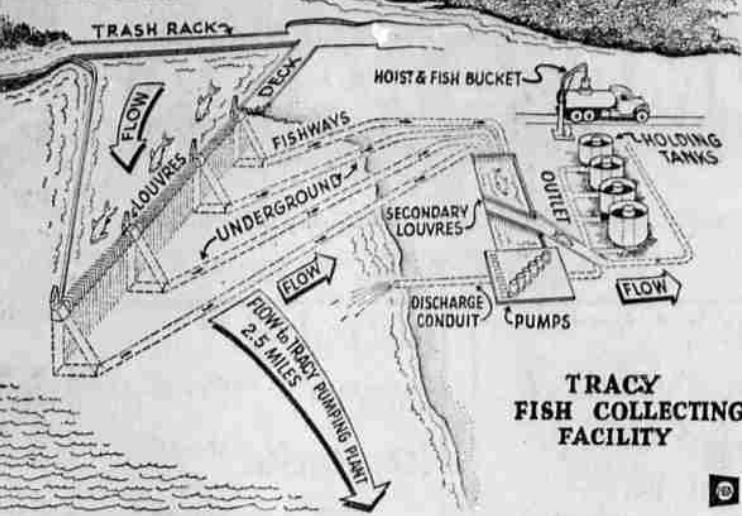

MASTER FISH CATCHER—Twelve million fish a year should satisfy any angler but for the operators of the Delta Moulata Canal in California's Central Valley it's all catching and no eating. Fish kept from the canal's pumps and the Tracy Fish Collecting Facility was built to keep them out. The canal's waters normally flow north toward the San Francisco Bay area and fish instinctively swim seaward, too. Periodically though, the Tracy pumps at the head of the canal are reversed and water flows south, toward Fresno, confusing the fish who think they're bound downstream with the current. The fish are drawn into huge holding tanks, transferred to tank trucks, carted downstream and dumped at Antioch, near the sea. The U.S. Bureau of Reclamation figures its fish-eliminator savings in hundreds of thousands of dollars.

U.S. Reds Push Youth Front, Seek Wide Membership Among Non-Reds

NEW YORK (NEA)—The founding convention of a new national Communist youth movement is now tentatively planned for late 1961.

It aims to be a "broad left-wing student, teen-age and working youth organization." It will seek to entice to membership a wide array of young Americans not now Communists. It will attempt to draw into a united front 80 major leftist youth groups. Communist leaders aim at hitting 30 per cent of this membership goal by Labor Day, 1961, the balance within a year.

This information leaked from the three-day organizing conference held in Chicago recently. These meetings set up a national organizing committee and decided on immediate aims.

The new organization will be a successor to the Young Communist League of the 1930s, the Communist-run American Youth for Democracy of the 1940s and the Labor Youth League of the 1950s. Since the latter folded in 1957, the U.S. Reds have had no national youth organization.

U.S. Communist boss Gus Hall has been watching the effectiveness of vigorous youth groups in Korea, in Turkey, in Latin America. He has noted the effectiveness with which his own Reds were able to influence some college-age young people in the San Francisco demonstrations against the House Committee on Un-American Activities. Hall and his aides have decided that through a vigorous Communist-front youth movement the Communist party has its best chance of making progress in the U.S.

The new national organization will be Communist controlled and Communist directed. Mortimer Daniel Rubin, national youth director of the Communist party, is one of the major founders. So is Jim West, head of the Communist organization in Illinois, and Daniel Queen, youth leader of the Illinois Communist party.

But the Communist party—to attract non-Red youth to a united front—apparently has decided that

the organization will be non-Communist on the surface.

The chairman of the national organizing committee for the youth movement is a Mrs. Alvin Buxbaum, 24, born in New Orleans and now teaching in Pennsylvania. She publicly says she is not a Communist. Twenty-one-year-old Marvin Markman of New York was named executive secretary.

But Communists were prominent among those attending the or-

ganizing conference in Chicago. Some 86 delegates registered for the Chicago meeting—29 from Illinois, 21 from Pennsylvania, 19 from New York, five from Ohio, four from Washington, three from California, two from Minnesota and one each from Michigan, Oregon and Iowa. There were 35 working youths or housewives, 33 college students, 10 teen-agers and six unemployed. The average age was 22. Twelve of the 86 were Negro.

Although the official founding of the movement will not take place until late this year, a hard core of activities is planned beginning now. These include:

Publication of a series of pamphlets on the problems and challenges to youth from the standpoint of "scientific socialism," which in Marxist language means communism.

Expansion of the Red-backed magazine, New Horizons for Youth. A \$10,000 fund raising drive is scheduled.

An aggressive, hard-hitting campaign circuit through college campuses and key cities to pull in leftist youth organizations and "progressive" young people throughout the United States. Leaders of the new movement, including Communist party youth director Rubin, are scheduled to set out on these tours right away. They'll make a special pitch to high school groups and other teen-agers.

Issuance of an organizational bulletin every three months.

The aims of the proposed youth organization are indicated by the remarks of the keynote speakers at the closed conference sessions. These leaders in private lauded the achievements of Communist nations. They asserted American youth are denuding a future like the future in the Soviet Union and Red China. They attacked the House Committee on Un-American Activities, the FBI and military training for American youth. They pledged to fight against American discrimination of Negroes and other minorities and to work for "scientific socialism."

At the recent Alfalfa Society dinner, the President was joking about his chief liaison man with the past Eisenhower administration, Clark M. Clifford, who has made much of the fact that he wants no federal job and intends to stick with his lucrative private law practice.

"All he's asked," Kennedy said, "is the right to advertise his law firm on the back of dollar bills." Kennedy also kidded Clifford about failing to get him a golf locker at Burning Tree, the golf club where former President Dwight D. Eisenhower was an ardent player.

This reminded Kennedy's friends that the President did not belong to any country club in the Washington area. Whereupon he was promptly informed, and so will you.

The Air Force has a new plane ready for the President; not new in age, but in White House usage. The plane is a C-119 (DC-8B in commercial aircraft terms) and will be used on trips where jet travel is not justified. This probably will end up as Kennedy's version of the Columbian, the super-G Constellation used by Eisenhower for shorter hauls.

The C-119, as yet unnamed, can haul 30 passengers as currently equipped, has a range of about 3,500 miles and a cruising speed of about 275 miles per hour.

Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy has passed the word: No more talking for publication by anyone about the redecoration of the family quarters in the White House. When the project is finished in about a month, she'll permit a small descriptive statement on the results.

She disliked the daily stories about her conferences with art experts, painters and redecorators. If the lady wants the walls a particular shade, she wants them all done before her color schemes are held up to public appraisal and comment.

On the afternoon of Jan. 23, 12:40 p.m. to be exact, a whisper-voiced woman telephoned the White House and murmured quickly, but distinctly, "You better watch this Kennedy—he hasn't long to live." The Secret Service was notified immediately, but the caller was gone in seconds.

Between the election and the inauguration, security men were somewhat surprised by the volume of "hate mail" that poured in on Kennedy. Little if any of it

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British Give Stock Answers

LONDON (UPI)—During a recent visit to the United States this correspondent found himself besieged by a lady wearing full war paint and armed with a king-size martini.

"What I want to know," she said, "is what do the British think about President Kennedy, is Tony Armstrong-Jones popular over there and is Princess Margaret pregnant?"

The lady had one well-manicured hand on the pulse of America, because the same questions in one form or another were asked in the Midwest, the South, New England and New York City. An omnibus question invites generalized replies and that is pretty much what the lady got. In this order:

Kennedy—Yes, he is popular in Britain for many of the same reasons he is popular in the United States. Women like the hair cut and the flashing smile. Serious young men are pleased that a young man has been elected President and has surrounded himself with a relatively young cabinet. But the broad base of his popularity is not that he is John F. Kennedy, 43 years old, but that he is a Democrat. By some whim of history Britain in her blackest hours has been rescued by Democratic Presidents—Woodrow Wilson, Franklin D. Roosevelt, Harry Truman. A Republican President probably would have responded just as quickly to distress signals, but it is an historical fact that the British are indebted to and grateful to the Democrats.

Tony Armstrong-Jones—Yes and no. He is extremely popular with the masses (he got a film star welcome from street crowds when he showed up for the first day on his new job). With the upper classes it's a different story. This correspondent has heard him denounced as an absent-minded young man who made a serious mistake when he neglected to be born into a European royal family or upper-crust British aristocracy.

Princess Margaret—Don't know. If she is pregnant, it is a secret held by a small circle consisting of Queen Elizabeth, Prince Philip, Armstrong-Jones, Queen Elizabeth the Queen Mother and some unidentified but eminent obstetrician. There was a flurry of excitement some weeks back when the princess appeared in a loose evening wrap, but two nights later she confounded the prophets of motherhood by wearing a tightly belted evening gown. The one solid piece of information in the haystack of gossip and speculation came from a person close enough to the royal family to know what he is talking about. He said Margaret had told the Queen that she would prefer not to have children for the first year or two of her marriage. Later, yes. If and when it happens the news will be broken in some such announcement as this: "Her royal highness Princess Margaret, Mrs. Antony Armstrong-Jones, will not undertake any public engagements for the next several months."
