# 'Machine Burglar' Hits Five Businesses In KF

A vending machine burglar who has been victimizing Klamath Falls auto dealers and business firms struck again Wednesday night and took a total of \$8.50 from five places.

The burglar returned to at least two places he has visited before. City police said the thief uses a large screwdriver to pry a window open to gain entry to buildings. If that fails, he breaks the glass and reaches in to unlock the window or door. He has a particular fondness for vending machines but is not above ransacking office desks.

Wednesday night's burglaries and the amounts taken were as follows: Robertson School of Business, 411 Main Street, 35 cents; Snappy Service Cafe, 1008 Main Street, \$4; Eccles Motors, 606 South Sixth Street, \$1.50; Joe Fisher Motors, 677 South Seventh, 75 cents; and Colyear Motor Sales Company, 508 South Sixth Street, 90 cents. An attempt was also made at Jim Olson Motors, 522 South Sixth Street.

The burglaries at Robertson's and Snappy Service were repeat performances. The thief stole \$42 from the business school over the weekend and Jan. 23 took \$40 from vending machines at the cafe. Investigating officers said the thief once again entered the KC Building through an unlocked street entrance and broke a glass door to gain entry to Robertson's. He broke a door to get into Snappy Service.

Vending machine cash boxes were smashed open in four of the five burglaries, but the thief apparently was satisfied at Colyear's after getting \$1 from a desk.

City police said the Eccles burglary was reported late Wednesday and the others were discovered as employees came to work Thursday morning. Beat officers were alerted during the night but were unable to turn up any suspects. A footprint was discovered outside Eccles. The burglary at Colyear was the last one reported. Police detectives are investigating.
