PORTLAND (AP)—Verne O. Bishop, chief deputy clerk of the U.S. District Court here, reported difficulty with governmental channels.

Great Beasts Said On Wane

PORTLAND (AP)—The great beasts and big game animals of Africa are disappearing, says Morgan Berry, an animal dealer and trainer.

Berry, whose home is Seattle, brought back some African animals for Portland's Zoo.

Many of the biggest animals have already been slaughtered in Africa during the current political chaos and the subsequent breakdown in the laws which protected most rare game animals, Berry said Wednesday.

"Most of the natives have no word for conservation in their languages. They have seen foreigners come into their country and shoot big game for a price. They see no reason why they shouldn't shoot them, too, now that they have rifles," Berry said.

Berry said he did not try to penetrate the Congo. "I got as far as Brazzaville, just across the river from Leopoldville. There have been reports of a Chicago animal dealer disappearing in that country," he said.

Police Officer Shoots Youth

GRESHAM (AP)—A policeman here said he shot a youth running from a car reported stolen Wednesday night.

Gresham policeman Billy Scott said he had just heard a stolen car report on the radio when he saw the car whip past.

He started after it, and after a three-mile chase, he said, the driver got out and began to run. Scott said he fired a warning shot, and then fired again when the man refused to stop.

Scott said his bullet struck the youth in the shoulder. Police identified the wounded man as Kenneth Leon Jones, 19, Portland.

Jones was sent to the hospital for removal of the bullet. He was held without formal charge.
