CAMERA *Angles*

Henry Burroughs, a home owner just outside of Washington, had a problem. He wanted to sell his house. Unfortunately, many of his neighbors also had the same problem so quite a number of "For Sale" signs dotted the area. There was very little response for months and no prospective buyers until Henry, who knows his way around with a camera, had an idea.

He made photography his sales agent and, by using an original approach, sold his house within three weeks.

He did it by photographing the best features of his house, inside and out, and combining the pictures into an attractive booklet which he left with real estate agencies. The brochure did its own selling, catching the eye of prospective buyers and promoting

active interest in his house while other homes remained just a list of addresses.

It's an idea that can be followed by other camera fans everywhere, not only where they are trying to sell their own homes but possibly in starting a neighborhood sideline with local real estate agencies or property owners.

The mechanics of making the booklet are simple enough. Each picture is printed on 8 x 10 projection paper, allowing space for a caption or description where necessary. Two finished pictures are mounted together, back-to-back with dry mounting tissue or rubber cement. The separate pages are then bound together with a spiral or plastic ring binder. This can be done inexpensively at stationery or art supply stores.

In order to print caption with picture, two exposures are required on the same sheet of paper: one for the photograph and one for the caption.

Burroughs first types all the captions on one sheet of paper, allowing a small space between each one. Then he copied the entire sheet on a piece of 4 x 5 contrast process film.

The next step was to compose the picture on the top part of the 8 x 10 print, masking the bottom to allow for the caption. A half dozen sheets of paper were exposed like this and put aside after Henry carefully marked the back of the paper to indicate the "top." The extra sheets were for duplicate booklets.

Then the picture negative was removed and the black-and-white caption negative put in the enlarger. This time the top part was masked and only the caption lines were exposed in the reserved space at the bottom. Then the combination prints were developed.

Booklets may run from three pages (6 pictures) to five pages (10 pictures) or more depending on the number of features to be shown. Pictures should be taken under the best conditions to make the house look most attractive. Burroughs used a 4 x 5 press camera with a normal 135mm lens for the exterior shots and a wide angle for the interiors to show as much as possible. Photo floods were used to complement the daylight coming in through the windows on the interior shots so a tripod is recommended.

35,000 Samples Of Milk Tested By Ag Department

During the past year over 35,000 pasteurized samples were tested for phosphatase.

The division also checked 900 samples of water for coliform. Warnings were issued to 85 fluid milk producers, 75 producer-distributors and 9 distributors for bacteria in their milk. Twenty-one producers, 19 producer-distributors, and 2 distributors were suspended for violating the fluid milk bacteria standard. Other producers and distributors received warnings or suspensions for violation standards of temperature, sediment, solids-not-fat, coliform, butyric acid and water content in products, in frozen desserts, butter and cheese as well as fluid milk.

As a result of the tests and inspections, 613 warnings were issued to producers and distributors and 105 licenses were suspended for violation of the milk composition or sanitation standards.

On sanitation inspection of dairies alone, warnings were issued to 136 producers, 22 producer-distributors and 3 distributors. Licenses were suspended for 36 producers and 7 producer-distributors for unsanitary condition of premises or equipment.

There were 9,438 samples of grade A fluid milk checked in 1960 by the state laboratory. Tests included analysis for compliance with bacteria, solids-not-fat, butyric acid, phosphatase and coliform. The phosphatase test is made on pasteurized milk to determine if it is properly pasteurized.

In frozen desserts 1,938 samples were collected and checked for bacteria, butyric acid, phosphatase and total solids.

Samples of butter were tested for butyric acid, phosphatase and for moisture. Over 140 cheese samples underwent analysis for butyric acid and moisture standards and

'Lost' Boys Face Juvenile Court

Two 8-year-old boys thought to be lost from home Wednesday night will appear in Juvenile Court Friday afternoon in connection with the burglary of the new Falcon Heights Elementary School.

School officials discovered the burglary Thursday morning and reported it to state police. A small ground level window beside the main door had been broken. Blackboards had been smeared with powder paint and school rooms had been ransacked. Two dollars and fifty cents in small change was taken from a teacher's desk.

State police said the two boys were apprehended because the hole in the window was too small for an adult to crawl through and also because one of the boys had written his girl friend's name on the blackboard.

The boys are said to have admitted the burglary. They are cited to appear in Juvenile Court at 4 p.m. Friday with their parents.
