## Stamps In The News

Switzerland annually issues a colorful set of stamps publicizing important events or programs of interest not only to the Swiss but all peoples. The 1961 "Publicity Series," now ready for issuance, consists of four stamps, each devoted to a different theme, according to the Swiss Philatelic Agency in America.

The 5 centimes gray, vermilion and blue green is for "Development Aid." The stamp shows a



wall under construction with a globe in front symbolizing the young nations of the world.

The 10 c blue-green and yellow is called "HYSPA 1961 BERN." It commemorates the hygiene, gymnastics and sports exhibition to be held in Bern this spring. The HYSPA emblem appears on the stamp.

The 20 c carmine, yellow and dark brown pays tribute to ice hockey and European championships to take place in Lausanne and Geneva March 2-12. Depicted is a hockey stick and a puck.

The 50 c blue, esmine and dark grey publicizes the fully automatic Swiss telephone service. Switzerland claims to be the first nation to have completed the conversion of its telephone system to fully automatic operation, whereby anyone can dial from any part of the country to another. This new stamp shows a wiring diagram superimposed on a map of Switzerland.

As previously announced in this column, the first United Nations commemorative stamp for 1961 honoring the international Court of Justice will be issued on Feb. 13.

Two countries have issued stamps honoring "Stamp Day" in their particular nation. The United Arab Republic has issued a 10 mills red depicting a model post office. It was the first U.A.R. issue of 1961 and marks the 90th anniversary of the transfer of the post office to governmental authority. Wording on the stamps is in Arabic and English.

Italy, just before the end of the year, issued its "Stamp Day" adhesive illustrating an old mail coach and horses (in black) with an enlarged posthorn (in red). The denomination is 15 lire.

## Knitting Popular With 4-H Members;

A revived interest in knitting, fostered by Oregon's younger generation, has brought forth new simplified knitting instruction from the state 4-H Club office at Oregon State College.

Ruth Brasher, state extension 4-H agent and project leader, thinks this new interest in knitting probably stems from increased popularity of knit ready-mades, improvement in yarns, and youth's desire to create something useful.

To meet the demand of this "new crop" of knitters, a new bulletin "4-H Knitting" is offered to youths who want to enroll in a 4-H knitting club.

Beginning club members learn to get the feel of different yarns and needles before they learn to bind and cast stitches—the first steps in making their own knitted garments.

With practice, they are able to make simple garments, tasseled caps, slippers and jackets. After a couple years experience, they advance to more difficult garments—jackets, knitted dresses, ski sweaters, and coats.

The original 4-H knitting project was revised last year by 4-H advisers, Mrs. Ruth Nyberg, Salem; Mrs. Paul Johnson, Oswego; Janet Bishop, Portland; Hildegard Streufert, OSC extension clothing specialist; and Miss Brasher. Club leaders around the state were also consulted, Miss Brasher noted.

Knitting is the fastest growing 4-H home economics clothing project. It has attracted about 2,700 youngsters into 4-H knitting clubs, three times as many as in clubs 10 years ago.

In addition to learning knitting skills, youths learn to read commercial patterns, create their own designs, understand basic art principles of color and design, grooming, and buymanship. Learning to work together in their club organization is another major gain the 9 to 12 year olds experience, Miss Brasher said.

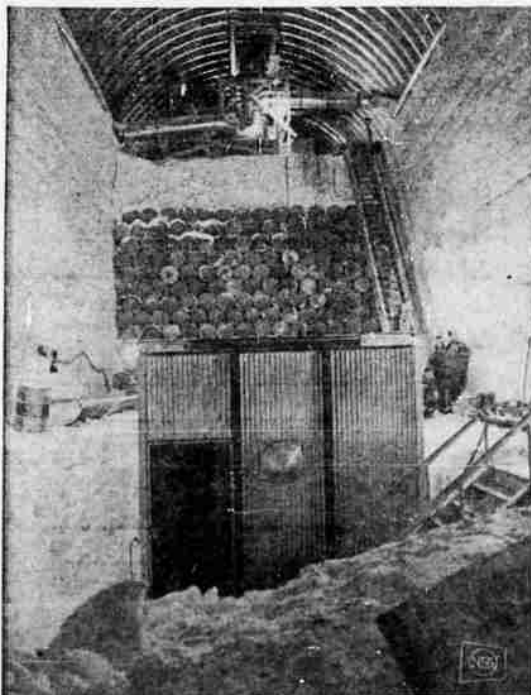
