Murtaugh Agrees To 1-Year Contract

Danny Murtaugh plays 'em one at the time and signs his contracts the same way.

Agreeing to a one-year pact even though he led the Pittsburgh Pirates to their first world championship in 35 years, Murtaugh signed on the dotted line Friday for an estimated \$10,000 raise that brought his salary to approximately \$40,000.

Murtaugh, puffing on a 50-cent cigar, said it took about one minute for him and Pirate General Manager Joe L. Brown to agree to terms.

"It was a one-year deal by mutual agreement," revealed the popular Pittsburgh skipper. "Joe said one year and I said okay."

Brown chimed in to say, "We hope to have Danny with us for many, many years. I hope it will be as long as Casey Stengel stayed with the Yankees."

Close-Knit Family

Murtaugh became the last major league manager to sign for 1961, but Brown explained there never was any hurry—or any doubt—because "we're like a closely-knit family."

The Los Angeles Dodgers announced the signing of southpaw pitcher Johnny Podres and second baseman Charlie Neal.

Podres was believed to have received a modest raise for the 14-12 record he compiled last season. Both he and Neal will receive about \$24,000 this year. Neal hit 256 last season.

Outfielder's Russ Snyder and Gene Stephens and rookie catcher Frank Zupac came to terms with the Baltimore Orioles, who now have signed a total of six players.

Frosh, 'Cats Post Wins Over Crater

Three Klamath Falls basketball clubs scored wins over the visiting Central Point schools at KUHS Saturday afternoon. Coach Bill Mansfield's sophomore Wildcats ran all over the Crater soph in the second half to gain a 61-38 victory, while the freshmen squeaked out to a 49-47 win in overtime from the Crater frosh.

Meantime, across the school in the girls' gym, the Fremont Jr. High squad nosed out the Crater 8th graders, 33-31, on a last-second bucket by Dave Robinson.

The Wildcats avenged their previous loss to the Comet sophs with a big 23-point win which put them into first place in the SOC standings astride an impressive 5-1 record.

All of the quarter scores were in favor of the 'Cats, 13-8 at the end of the first round, 28-17 at halftime, and 39-29 at the conclusion of the third frame. The sophomores were led by Fred Kelly who scored 20 points and hauled in seven rebounds, Ray Taylor who turned in a terrific job on the boards, nabbing 12 rebounders and making seven counters from the field, and Wayne Chamberlain with five points and 10 rebounds.

After trailing the Central Point frosh throughout the contest, KU's baby Pelicans rallied in the closing minutes of the final period to knot the score 44-44 at the buzzer. After a last-second one-shot offensive strategy failed and threw the game into the overtime period, the freshmen used the same plan to give them their victory.

Just the reverse of the sophomore hassle, the quarter totals were all against the Klamath five. Crater jumped off to an early 14-8 lead in the first quarter, but they had to fight to keep on top as the KU cagers battled back to close the gap to 24-22 at halftime. The scoring pace remained about the same and the third period ended 35-31 in the Comets' favor.

Big Hal Holman came through for the Klamath cause with 20 points, but teammates Larry Binns and Marv Yunk had to come in to handle the overtime proceedings. They scored 10 and 14 respectively.

Manhattan Tracksters Snap 19-Year-Old Indoor Record

NEW YORK (AP)—Manhattan track coach George Eastment, never one to sound an optimistic note when he can't think of something gloomy, predicted today his two-mile relay team would break 7:30 indoors.

"Now this is no mean feat. It's akin to breaking the four-minute mile on boards.

But Friday night in the Millrose games in Madison Square Garden, Eastment's quartet whipped to a 7:32.8 clocking, breaking the 19-year-old indoor record of 7:33.9 set by Seton Hall on a faster nine-lap track.

Indoor standards are not recognized by the international federation.

"I knew we could break the record," said the happy Eastment. "But believe it or not, I wasn't sure we could win the race. With Holy Cross and Villanova in it, I figured that any of the top teams might break the record."

Many coaches have said down through the years (and their predictions stood up until Friday night) that the Seton Hall record never would be broken unless someone found a nine-lap track again. The Garden's track, along with most of the standard indoor tracks in the country, measures 11 laps to mile and those extra turns can hurt a team trying for a record.

Eastment kept the quartet—John Corry, Kye Courtney, Larry St. Clair and Art Evans out of the individual events to concentrate on the relay and it paid off. Corry was clocked in 1:55.1, Courtney in 1:54.2, St. Clair in 1:51.8, and Evans in 1:51.7.

Holy Cross was second, about 25 yards back, and Villanova third.

'Still's' 52 Sets New NBA Record

Wilt Chamberlain's added some brand new numbers to his National Basketball Association "record cabinet."

Tireless Wilt poured in 32 points, setting Boston Garden marks for total points and field goals, and led the Philadelphia Warriors to a 136-135 victory over the Cincinnati Royals Friday night. The victory left the Warriors 5½ games behind first-place Boston in the Eastern Division because the Celtics whipped the New York Knickerbockers, 123-109, in the second game of the doubleheader.

The Detroit Pistons defeated the Syracuse Nationals, 121-118, in the other NBA Friday night action.

Chamberlain's 52 points lopped the previous Garden mark of 51 set by George Yardley, Jan. 15, 1958, and his 23 field goals were three more than the court mark established by Hal Greer last year. Wayne Embry was high scorer for the Royals with 37 points.

Gene Conley and Sam Jones led a 38-point fourth-period burst that carried the Celtics to their eighth win in 10 games with the Knicks. Tom Heinsohn led Boston's scoring with 21 points and Richie Guerin had 28 for New York.

Bailey Howell scored 26 points and Gene Shue 21 for Detroit while Dolph Schayes had 36 for Syracuse.

Henley Hornet Muscle-Men Miss Win Because Of Forfeit

ASHLAND (Special)—A well-considered decision by Henley coach Nelson Olson may have cost his Henley Hornets their first win of the wrestling season here Saturday afternoon. Olson decided that co-captain Dave Kennon, who had become ill on the mat, was unable to continue, and the necessary five point penalty proved enough to give the Ashland Grizzlies a 29-25 victory.

Kennon, a very recent sufferer from a lung infection, became nauseated during action in which he was ahead on points, and Olson felt obligated to stop the match, despite Kennon's understandable protest.

Rudometkin collected 27 points as he led his team to its fifth straight victory in the Athletic Conference of Western Universities. The Trojans are the only undefeated team in the running.

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
