The County B league-leading Chiloquin Panthers had 11111 trouble piling up an 85-54 victory over the Grizzlies at Gilchrist Friday night to keep their unblemished record intact but the second-place clubs couldn't say the same.

Merrill had to work for everything it got in topping the Antlers 39-51 at Bonanza while the Malin cagers shook off a late fourth quarter tie to finally subdue the Trojans 56-45 at Bly.

In the non-counting action Friday night the Sacred Heart Trojans nailed the KU Sophs 57-49 in an action-packed overtime on the SHA floor after the KU Fresh squad had tripped the Trojan Jayvees 48-44 in an equally close contest.

Chiloquin 85, Gilchrist 54 County B big guns, Butch Crome and Gerald Warren, waged a red-hot scoring duel and the Grizzlies' Warren won 29-27 over the Chiloquin flash.

Warren counted only 16 of his total from the field but was successful on 18 of 17 shots from the free throw line. Crome bagged 11 two-pointers and five for seven at the foul line. Crome, however, left the game a shade early with five fouls charged him.

The Panthers led all the way, 23-10, 43-19 and 73-34 while coach Gordie Kuist cleaned his bench. Chiloquin's "Smiling Ed" Case was the number three producer with 29 while Frank Heglund was next with 15.
