



# THE OWL HOOTS

Every educational institution tries to determine first what its objectives are, what kind of an institution it wants to be, and then create that image in the minds of all its publics—students, parents, legislators, sports fans, the man in the street, etc. This is no easy job in any case. At Oregon Tech it seems that the story of the four blind men and the elephant is apropos to the situation. The first man touched its trunk and said the elephant is much like a rope; the second who touched its side said it was much like a wall; the third claimed it much like a tree after touching its leg; and the fourth touched its tail and thought it was much like a snake. Perhaps the biggest problem in picturing Oregon Tech's image is the fact that technician training is so broad that it defies description in any simple terms. Let's see if we can figure out some reasons by looking back at what has happened to education since its beginning in the United States.

In 1607 Capt. John Smith came to America to settle it for England. He brought with him some goldsmiths to gather America's gold and a few gentlemen. He sent word back to England "send me some craftsmen or we will starve to death."

Later in 1620 when the Pilgrims came to the new land they brought with them the most advanced technologies of the world from England and Holland. The tools of these technologies were the saw, chisel, axe, adze, hammer, shovel and similar tools. The formal education of the time consisted of the three Rs and that primarily for the purpose of understanding the Bible.

It was more than 200 years later that the American industrial revolution really got started rolling. It was after 1850 that refinement of crude oil and the development of the combustion engine contributed to modern methods of transportation. With the development of electricity during the same period the telephone and telegraph became the first of modern distance communication methods.

It was well into the 1900s before the radio was developed and it has been only in the last decade that television, jet and thrust propulsion engines, antibiotics, electronic brains, nuclear fission, and space age engineering and science has been discovered or advanced to its present stages.

What does all of this add up to? The university graduate schools, and research beyond that stage, are at the apex of advancement in our modern technologies. A bachelor's degree is hardly more preparation for success in life today than a high school diploma was 15 or 20 years ago. The educational level of yesterday's engineer and scientist is the level of today's technician. The advancement of education for professional engineers and scientists has been so fast that the field left behind has become so broad and transcendent that the technical institute has a problem in defining its objectives concurrently with keeping its programs abreast of the demands of industrial and scientific progress which require its objectives to continually change.

The dissertation above may not have helped readers get an image of OTI but the last sentence did become so complicated that this writer got the idea that he had better get back to current news on the campus.

# Weed Council Favoring Proposed Split Of Tax

WEED—The city's new council met Thursday evening to pound out a basic legal structure councilmen hope will serve the city well for a long time.

Councilmen first went on record favoring the 85 per cent-15 per cent tax "split" proposed by the county, regarding a county sales tax.

Weed thus is the first of Siskiyou County's larger cities to approve the ratio proposed for them by county supervisors.

To yield tax revenue in the interim before the standby county sales tax ordinance goes into effect, city councilmen passed an ordinance calling for a one per cent sales tax in the city.

Both ordinances were read by title only. Second readings and probable action on the ordinances are expected during a special meeting Thursday, Feb. 9, at 7:30 p.m.

Councilmen also set a 40-hour work week for city office personnel, from 8:30 a.m. until 5:30 p.m. daily, and they set the salary of the deputy city clerk at \$200 per month—the third step of a five-step salary schedule.

And they set up a sick leave benefit allowance of 12 days per year per employee, adopted a social security plan, agreed to a state employment retirement system for city employees and decided to study hospitalization benefit plans before adopting the latter measure.

Councilmen heard the first reading of the city business license ordinance, adapted from the county's ordinance. They made adjustments in the ordinance to affect certain service trades not required to obtain county business licenses.

Councilmen raised the license fee for circuses or exhibitions from \$50 to \$100 daily, pawnbrokers' license fees from \$10 to \$100 annually, license fees for vehicles for hire to \$20 annually each, fees for palmists and allied specialists to \$100 annually and they set up a licensing system affecting services from outside the city, such as bakeries, creameries, fuel companies.

Councilmen decided to take more time before appointing members to a planning commission. The matter is expected to come up again during the next special meeting.

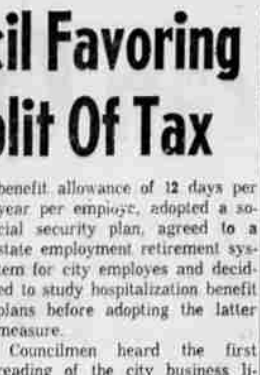

# Work Starts On New VFW Building

YREKA—According to a report from Delbert Haley, who is in charge of construction of the new Veterans of Foreign Wars Post building on East Lemmon Street, volunteer workmen have already started work on the project and were to put in frames to pour a concrete floor Saturday.

The structure which will accommodate about 75 persons has been estimated to cost approximately \$4,000. The total floor plan is 24 by 32 feet. The plan also includes two restrooms, a kitchen and two small storage areas.

Haley stated the building will be a frame type structure with board and batten exterior siding, with sheet rock lining the interior walls. He also described the floor as being finished in tile. The ceiling will have acoustical tile. Conventional shingles will be used on the roof.

Haley also estimated that a parking area is available at the site to accommodate about 75 cars. It is expected that the construction will be completed by May of this year in time for the installation of the new VFW officers.

Haley concluded by stating the hall will probably be made available to other groups who might wish to use the facilities.

# Committee Gets Legal Advice On Pornography

SALEM (AP)—Hard-core pornography — not so-called men's magazines with pictures of semi-nude women — is the only type of reading matter which can be restricted by legislative action, the Senate Judiciary Committee was told Friday.

Dist. Atty. William Frye of Lake County, president of the Oregon District Attorneys Association, testified in opposition to two bills designed to curb obscene matter.

Frye said the District Attorneys Association had gone on record opposing both measures.

Frye said nothing could be accomplished under the one bill — which would forbid sale to any child under 18 material manifestly tending to corrupt his sexual morality — that can't be done under existing law.

He urged the legislators to modernize the existing anti-obscenity statute, recently upheld by the Oregon Supreme Court, instead of passing a new measure to replace it.

Bruce Avrit of Eugene, an attorney representing 12 Oregon wholesale magazine dealers, termed the "under 18" bill unworkable.

He did urge passage of a second
