Wilderness Bill To Get Early Congress Hearing

WASHINGTON (AP) — A bill to set up a national program for preservation of wilderness areas will get an early hearing in the new Congress. Similar measures have met with strong opposition in the past.

Wilderness Bill To Get Early Congress Hearing

The Senate Interior Committee's first scheduled hearing this session is set for Feb. 27-28, with a strongly backed new wilderness bill the subject.

Wilderness Bill To Get Early Congress Hearing

The bill, designed to preserve millions of acres of wilderness lands in their natural state, was introduced by the committee chairman, Sen. Clinton P. Anderson, D-N.M., and has 13 cosponsors. Similar measures have been introduced in the House.

Wilderness Bill To Get Early Congress Hearing

Previous wilderness bills were blocked by opposition stimulated by groups and individuals using federal lands which would be involved.

Wilderness Bill To Get Early Congress Hearing

These groups include ranchers with livestock grazing on federal lands, miners, loggers and oil well drillers who protested their rights were threatened.

Wilderness Bill To Get Early Congress Hearing

Protests were voiced at committee hearings in Seattle, Phoenix and here. About 500 witnesses testified.

Wilderness Bill To Get Early Congress Hearing

An estimated 10,000 letters and postcards were received by the committee from persons interested in the bill. Members of Congress got thousands more.

Wilderness Bill To Get Early Congress Hearing

The Senate bill was revised dozens of times at numerous committee meetings in 1959 and 1960. Finally it was virtually amended to death and never reached the Senate for a week.

Wilderness Bill To Get Early Congress Hearing

Sponsors of the 1961 version say it is designed to satisfy reasonable critic of predecessor bills, and would fully protect existing rights to use of federal lands.

Wilderness Bill To Get Early Congress Hearing

In a statement of policy, the bill says: "The Congress recognizes that an increasing population, accompanied by expanding settlement and growing mechanization, is destined to occupy and modify all areas within the United States and its possessions except those that are designated for preservation and protection in their natural condition."

Wilderness Bill To Get Early Congress Hearing

"It is accordingly declared to be the policy of . . . Congress . . . to secure for the American people of present and future generations the benefits of an enduring resource of wilderness."

Wilderness Bill To Get Early Congress Hearing

The wilderness system would be composed of federally owned areas . . . to be administered for the use and enjoyment of the American people in such manner as will leave them unimpaired for future use and enjoyment as wilderness, and to provide for the preservation of these areas and the protection of their wilderness character."

Wilderness Bill To Get Early Congress Hearing

The wilderness system would comprise about 45 million acres of federal lands, mostly roadless forest and park areas.
