

Mrs. Kennedy Is Startled By Her Finds

WASHINGTON (UPI) — What are the "startling discoveries" Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy has made about the White House? This was the mystery intriguing the capital today.

The first lady's press secretary, Miss Pamela Turnure, made the intriguing disclosure Friday that Mrs. Kennedy came across startling discoveries during her first two weeks in the executive mansion.

Mrs. Turnure said the first lady would make the discoveries public soon. She said she did not know what they were.

The attractive press secretary would say only that Mrs. Kennedy "has learned some startling things she wants to share."

These things were discovered, Miss Turnure said, during Mrs. Kennedy's tour of the White House with members of the Fine Arts Commission.

Capital observers speculated about what the discoveries might be.

Had Mrs. Kennedy discovered secret passages or rooms in the White House? Were some of the historic treasures missing? Were heretofore unknown valuable paintings and furnishings found?

Keep watching for the startling conclusion of the "mystery of the White House discoveries."

Hatfield Goes To Conference

SALEM (AP) — Gov. Mark O. Hatfield and three other officials are in Boise, Idaho, for a meeting to discuss methods of restoring Columbia River salmon runs.

Attending are the governors and fish officials of Washington, Idaho and Oregon. Hatfield suggested the meeting be held.

The Oregon party, which left by train Sunday afternoon, included state Game Director Phil Schneider, state Fisheries Director Robert Schumier and Dan Allen, secretary of the state Natural Resources Committee.

Senate President Harry Robinson will be acting governor while Hatfield is out of the state.

Hatfield's usual Monday press conference will be held, instead, at 3:30 p.m. Tuesday.

Orchardists Protest Bills

SALEM (AP) — Some 200 persons—mostly orchard owners—showed up Friday in opposition to two bills to remove the property tax exemptions for fruit trees.

At present, only orchard land is taxable and not the trees, but the bill would change this to make the trees taxable as well as orchard land.

Charles Mack, chairman of the State Tax Commission, spoke in support of the bill on the grounds of tax equality. He said also it was difficult to assess the land apart from the vegetation on it, especially range land.

Rep. George Annala, D-Hood River, said the law in his county resulted in a heavy shift of taxes from orchards to home owners, business owners and even other farmers.

Paul Culbertson, Medford pear grower, said that the pear growing industry faced a serious problem with pear decline in Jackson County, and this affected the tax-paying ability.

Culbertson said pear decline had reduced production in the area by about one-third. He said that local growers had put up some \$25,000 to bolster a state-supported research effort to find the cause of the pear decline.

Nutritionist Warns Dealers

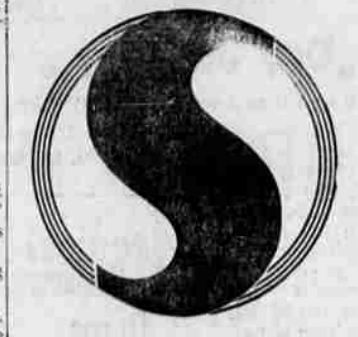
CORVALLIS (AP)—An animal nutritionist has told feed dealers they must carefully comply with the letter of the law on feed drugs.

Dr. H. S. Wigfus of the Ray Ewing Co. of Paradise, Calif., told 200 dealers at the 19th Animal Nutrition Conference that the Food and Drug Administration is expected to make closer inspections to insure compliance.

There is a need, he said, to follow more closely regulations governing use of chemicals in live stock feed.

Wenatchee Man Uses A Battery For Heart Beat

WENATCHEE, Wash. (AP) — Jim Miller is an electrician by trade and not quite literally his work is in his heart.

It wasn't Jim, but a team of surgeons at the University of Washington Hospital in Seattle, who equipped Miller's heart with battery power.

A few months ago life was running out for Jim Miller. He had fainting spells, his vision was faulty, his feet were always cold. His wife, Mary, recalls that she carried his meals to him because walking to the table had become a major project.

Doctors diagnosed Miller's condition as a heart block. Electrical conduction was insufficient to make the heart beat properly. Instead of the normal 60 to 80 per minute, his pulse rate was down to 24.

Two tiny electrodes were sewn into Miller's heart muscle in a rare and delicate operation.

Much as Miller himself had installed floorbells, the surgeons strung wire through his body to a battery—a power pack that will operate about five years before a replacement is necessary.

This too, is inside the body—a package about the size of a king-sized pack of cigarettes. It rests just under the skin, sending impulses to Miller's heart at the rate of 60 per minute.

Before he left the hospital the doctors put Miller on a treadmill as a final test. He walked with steady step and steady heart.

Walking to the table for dinner since once more is merely an incident in the day for Jim Miller. He trots up and down stairs. He is getting his fishing gear ready for the winter steelhead trout season.

His battery-encouraged heart pumps blood to all parts of the body at a steady 60 beats per minute; he faints no more, his vision is excellent.

And his feet are warm.
