

# Oretech Cagers Take Giant Step; Whip Raiders 57-54 In Overtime

## Casebier, Van Wormer Earn Berths

PENDLETON (Special)—A pair of Klamath County gridders, end Cal Casebier of the Henley Hornets, and center Doug Van Wormer of the Chiloquin Panthers, were today named to play in the annual East-West Shrine game to be played here Aug. 26.

The pair was named to play on the East squad which will be coached by Bob George of Mac-Hi. The West club is to be guided by Mary Heater of Monmouth-Independence's Central High.

St. Mary's of Medford and Mac-Hi each placed three men on the East squad while Central placed a trio on the West team.

Casebier earned his position of his performance in the A-2 Rogue League while Van Wormer was voted in because of his work in the Klamath County B League. Both earned conference all-star honors.

In 1960 the East-West Shrine Committee decided to include both A-2 and B school players on the teams.

Smith, who put on one of the finest basketball demonstrations ever seen in the conference, hauled in 20 rebounds during the hard-fought action and hit 12 field goals with an assortment of hard-to-check shots. At the foul line he hit three for seven.

Wilson, the number two producer for the Techmen, connected for six field goals and one free toss and 13 points that served, numerous times, to put the Owls back in the ball game.

In the first half the score was tied six times before ending 22-all, the largest lead either club had being a temporary five points.

During the second half the score was hooked three more times until the Owls slowly started to edge away with 13 minutes to go.

Carrigan was the number two scorer with 20 Raider points, hitting his famous two-hander from outside.

Also coming in for a big share of praise from coach Palmberg were Howlett Nash, who had nine points and was instrumental in the second half surge; Gene Branson, who had seven and was forced to play despite an ailing leg, and Norm Johns, who although he scored only one point, was rugged on defense against the determined SOC quint.

"I don't feel like I'm the champ yet," the usually taciturn Philadelphia said in his dressing room Tuesday night after stopping young Jesse Bowdry of St. Louis in the ninth round to win the blessings of the NBA.

"When I beat the old man (Archie Moore), I'll get that feeling," Moore knocked out Johnson in the 14th round in Johnson's only other shot at the title. The NBA whisked the crown from Moore's furrowed brow when he took an

## Exile Over For Jensen; Rejoins Sox

Jackie Jensen is officially back with the Boston Red Sox and now the question is whether he'll pay the same physical penalty for his self-imposed one-year exile that Cincinnati's famed Ed Roush did 20 years ago.

Jensen, who retired after the 1959 season, received an estimated \$35,000 in 1960 when he was released by the Red Sox. The Sox added that he has been working out daily at both squash and badminton at his Nevada home and says that he will be in good physical condition when the team begins spring training at Scottsdale, Ariz., late this month.

The big question with the Red Sox, however, is whether Jensen can recover the form that enabled him to win the American League's most valuable player award in 1958 and to bat .277 with 28 homers and 112 runs batted in in 1959.

He put Bowdry on the canvas three times in a classic variety of poses, and after the third knockdown referee Cy Gottfried decided the wobbly, woozy, rubber-legged youth was in no condition to continue.

The end came in 45 seconds of the ninth round. The record crowd of 4,017 which paid a non-record \$20,829.50 started whooping.

Johnson, at 172 pounds, was the artist while the 23-year-old Bowdry, at 174, was the tenacious bulldog making himself a difficult target. The first few rounds were uneventful.

Late in the sixth Bowdry landed a couple of good punches, and suddenly became too brave. He drove in again, and was clipped by a left hook. He started to throw another punch, but suddenly fell apart in a delayed action fall. He took a count of nine.

With two seconds to go in the eighth a right and left combination dumped him in a jackknife pose. He was resting on the back of his neck when the gong sounded.

Johnson was a whirling pinwheel of action as the ninth opened. He threw punches from everywhere, with a solid left to the midsection the clincher. Bowdry went down for the final time, and would have been a sitting duck when he arose had not the referee intervened.
