Historians say that one year a certain Miss Stuart got the Duke of Richmond's name and received a jewel worth four thousand dollars from him. The following year, failing to draw a royal partner, she got a ring worth only fifteen hundred dollars. The practical and frugal historian-diarrist Samuel Pepys participated in these lotteries but gave only green hose and garters to his fair lady.

The romantic French, as might be expected, elevated Valentine writing to an art while the conservative English published a practical guide to composing these verses. Valentines were first sent in America by parents to their children.

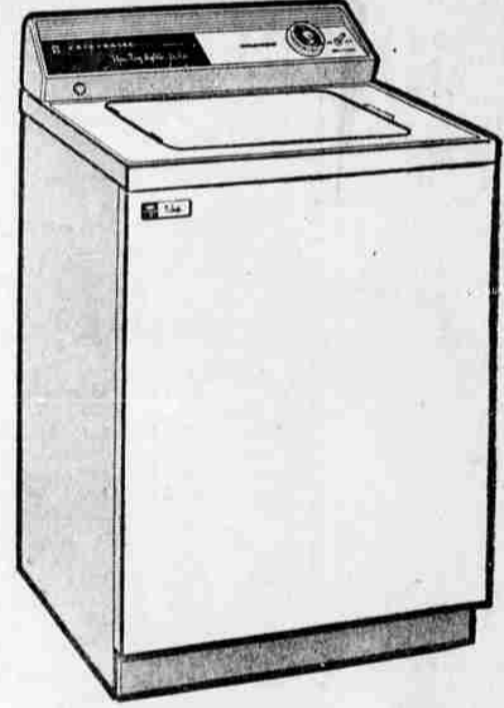
