Solons Vote To Abolish Booze Cards

SALEM (AP)—The Oregon Senate voted 22-7 today to abolish state liquor purchase permits, but to require persons between 21 and 25 years old to obtain identification cards from the Liquor Commission. The bill goes to the House.

Sponsors said the permit system serves no useful purpose, and that its abolition would make it easier for tourists to buy liquor. They said the identification cards would prevent sale of liquor to persons under 21 years of age.

But opponents objected that doing away with the permits would cost \$330,000 a year in revenue, half of which goes to the cities.

The opponents failed 18-11 in a move to send the bill to the Ways and Means Committee for a study of these financial angles.

Sen. Andrew J. Natelson, D-Newport, said the proposed new system has worked well in Washington state. He said the Liquor Commission feels that the permits no longer are needed.

"The prime objective," he said, "is to keep liquor away from minors."

But Sen. Vernon Cook, D-Troutdale, said the state has enough financial troubles without reducing revenues.

Sen. Al Flegel, D-Roseburg, asserted that the liquor permit system was designed to control purchase of liquor, but it has not worked.

Loss of revenue to the cities probably would be made up by legislation to increase the cities' 10 per cent share of liquor revenues to 15 per cent, he said.

The House passed and sent to the Senate a memorial asking Congress to repeal the federal excise taxes on transportation and telephones. It had the sponsorship of all 90 legislators.

A compromise measure to try to solve the controversial timber tax problem was introduced under sponsorship of 35 of the 60 House members.

their tax increase for 1962 would be \$6. In 1963 the increase would total \$18.50. The hike would be smaller in 1962 because for that year the tax would continue at 3 per cent, the present rate, but would be on the first \$5,000 of wages. The next year the tax rate would jump to 3 1/2 per cent.

The additional Social Security cost would be less in the case of workers earning less than \$5,000 a year.

Prospects for the Kennedy health insurance program are regarded as somewhat brighter this year than last, but it still faces rough going. In 1960 Dwight D. Eisenhower, then president, was a leader of the successful battle against tying health insurance for the aged to the Social Security program. Congress approved, and Eisenhower signed into law, a substitute program expanding federal grants to the states, which are required to act first. Nothing much has been done to implement this law and it is uncertain whether it would remain on the books if Congress should enact the Kennedy program.

There still is much opposition in Congress to such a program. And the American Medical Association is vigorously against it. Anticipating the arguments sure to be raised, Kennedy said today: "This program is not a program of socialized medicine. It is a program of prepayment of health costs with absolute freedom of choice guaranteed. Every person will choose his own doctor and hospital."

"No service performed by a physician at either home or office and no fee be charged for such would be involved, covered or affected in any way. There would be no supervision or control over the practice of medicine by any doctor or over the manner in which medical services are provided by any hospital."

SALEM (AP) — A compromise measure intended to solve a controversial timber tax problem was introduced today under sponsorship of 35 of the 60 Oregon House members.

Rep. W. O. Kelsay, D-Roseburg, the chief sponsor, said it is a "compromise between the extremes of timber taxation. It will bring in slightly more money, provide a bit of relief for the slow cutter, and add a little to the load of the fast cutter."
