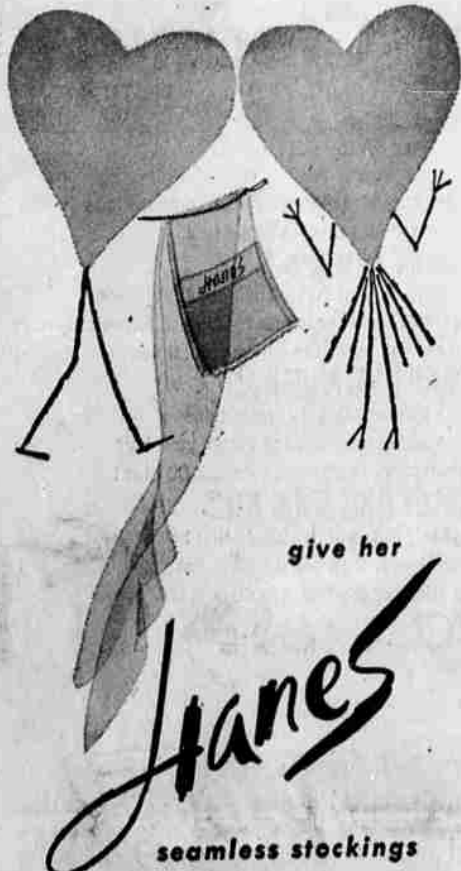

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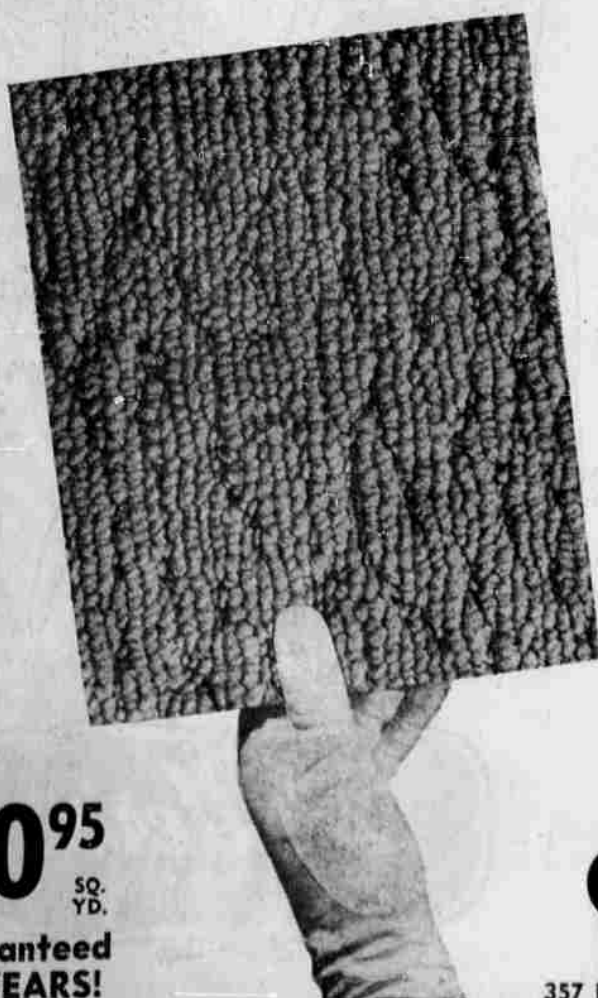


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Rebekah Lodge

Women of the Anchor Club will decorate the club house for the party.



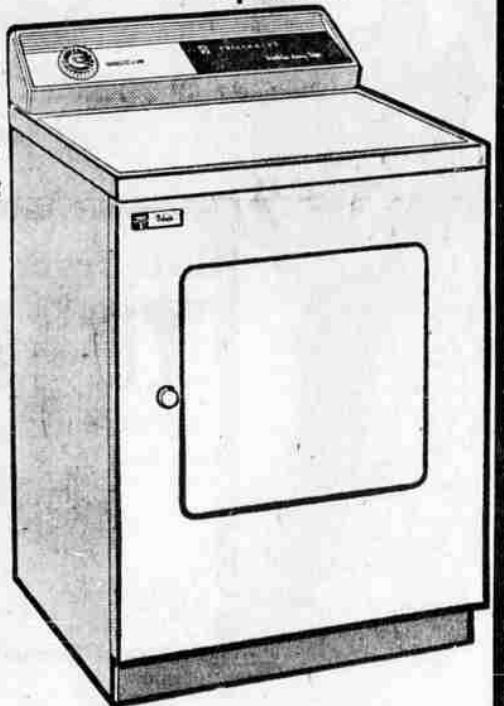
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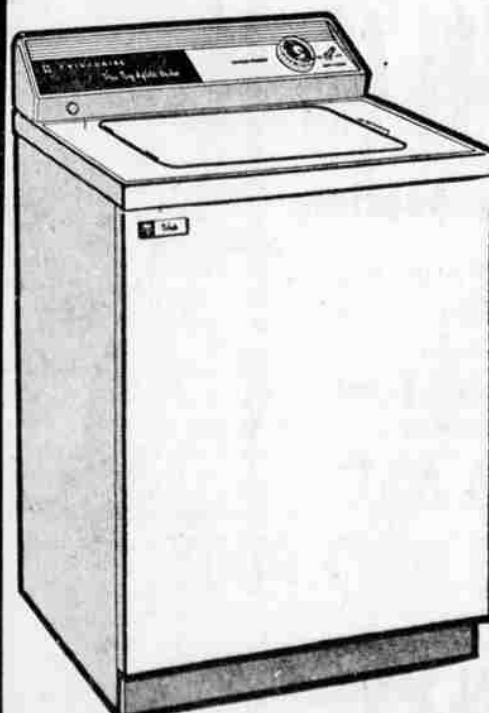


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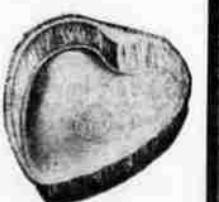
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
