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None Of Big Legislation Acted On Yet By Oregon's Legislature

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Agriculture Department Friday

estimated the 1961 winter season potato crop at 4,035,000 hundredweight, up nearly a fourth from last year's crop of 3,264,000. The production by states included 1,116,000 hundredweight for Oregon, and 2,919,000 for California.

100-day session are correct. The committees appear to be well ahead of the usual pace by holding hearings earlier than normal. But none of the big legislation has been passed by either house.

Here is the status of the important legislation:

Taxation—It is becoming increasingly evident that the legislature won't make any major tax law changes.

proposals to levy a 3-cent cigarette tax, reduce income taxes, and replace the inventory tax with a levy on net business income. The House Taxation Committee will be ready to move after it completes its hearings on March 8.

Finance—Subcommittees of the Joint Ways and Means Committee are working hard to prune Gov. Mark Hatfield's budget. The committee should be ready to send some of the big appropriation bills to the floor next month.

Reorganization—The second of a long series of hearings will be held Wednesday night on the governor's plan to reorganize the state government. This one will

be on the proposal to abolish the Board of Control. The whole reorganization plan, designed to centralize state activities under the governor, is headed for lots of trouble. The hearings will go on for weeks.

Welfare—A second hearing will be held Tuesday night on the Governor's charge that the Welfare Commission is incompetent. He wants the commission abolished, and wants it moved from Portland to Salem. This has caused much controversy within the legislature.

Labor—Bills to have state-sponsored elections to determine bargaining agents and to prosecute unfair labor and manage-

ment practices are in the Senate. State and Federal Affairs Committee. There is general agreement on the elections bill. But labor opposes the unfair practices bill. A hearing on it will be held late this month.

Education—Legislation to boost the \$105 per child per year aid to school districts to \$115 is before the House Education Committee. Measures to change the formula for distributing this money will be introduced this week. Bills to create four junior colleges were introduced Thursday. And the measure to increase minimum salaries to teachers will be considered by the Senate Monday.

Reapportionment—Nothing has been done to reapportion the legislature under the Constitution's provision for apportionment by population. But there are two proposed changes in the Constitution. One would give each county at least one senator. The other would give each county at least one representative.

Highways—Measures have been introduced to reduce the gas tax by one cent a gallon, and there are proposals for bond issues to speed highway construction. A bill in the Senate Highway Committee would restrict billboards on freeways.

Industrial Accident—The Senate State and Federal Affairs Committee has the controversial three-way bill, and it is opposed by labor. It provides for accident insurance through the state, self-insurance or private insurance. The state Industrial Accident Commission now has a virtual monopoly on this business.

Power—Further hearings will be held on the bill to prevent future duplication of electric power distribution systems. Public power agencies oppose it. A bill to create a state power commission which would distribute federal power and build its own power plants, will be introduced.

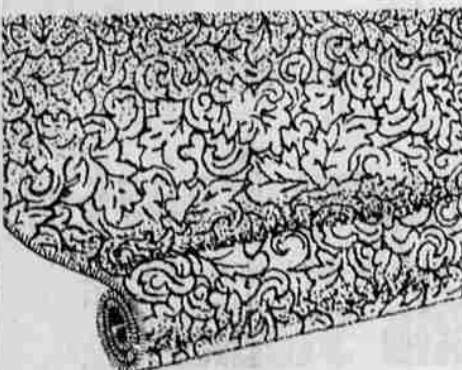
