

Techmen Humiliate EOC 104-61, Record Conference Season High

Friday night there was a ball game on the OTI floor for about the first three minutes, but from there on it was a complete rout. The Techmen's 104-61 win set a season high for Oregon Collegiate Conference action so far, but at that, the Owl fans were convinced that the final tally could have just as easily read in the neighborhood of 140 or so.

Palmberg pulled his first five-out of the ball game after they had scored 26 points in the first 5:23 of the second half and kept them on the bench for better than 12 minutes of the period while the reserves made life miserable for the visitors.

When the scoreboard read 93-54 for the Owls with 2:51 left, the fans, and the starting five, for that matter, set up such a clamor for point number 100 that Palmberg gave his original five the go-sign - - and they did.

In their hurry, however, they missed a number of tries which cut their overall percentage down to .471 for the night before high-point Bob Petersen hit a pair of free tosses to make it 95 and Norm Johns netted a jumper for out of the ball game after they had scored 26 points in the first 5:23 of the second half and kept them on the bench for better than 12 minutes of the period while the reserves made life miserable for the visitors.

Leon Wilson was awarded the honor of hitting the century tally. He drew a 1-1 situation with 30 seconds showing and laughingly dropped the first one through the twine and then added 101 for good measure.

When the Mounties took the ball out of bounds Smith spoiled their plans with a tremendous leap that stopped a long pass and gave the Techmen the ball out of bounds beneath their own bucket.

Petersen moved in underneath the basket, took the pass, faked once, then climbed for an easy layup and drew a foul en route. With a big grin Petersen sank number 104 and it was all over. One of the biggest shocks the

Mounts must have felt was the manner in which the Northwest's number two scorer behind Gonzaga's Frank Burgess, Larry Applegate, was handled.

Applegate, who was guarded by Hewlett Nash, the Owls' number three scorer, was held to a miserly three points in the first half and ended up with only 11, most of which were charged to the Owl subs.

Teammate Tom Neel, number seven on the list of NW scorers, was high for the losers with 20, and a large portion of his were also charged up against the reserves.

Nash, who hit 15 off seven field goals and 1-2 at the foul line, got the point-parade started for the Owls by canning a jumper with only seven seconds gone. Wilson came up with an outsider, Nash hooked one in from the key and Smith added a fall-away jumper and the Owls were off to the races.

From here on they could do nothing wrong while the Mounties could do nothing right.

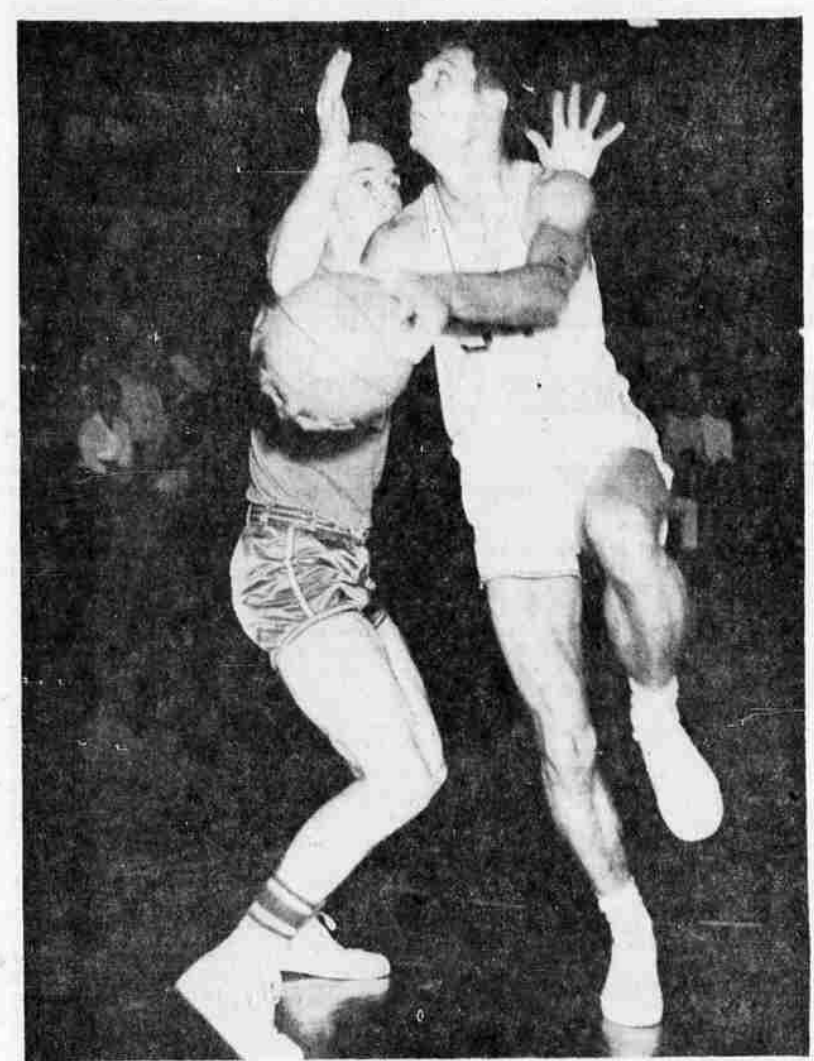
All the EOC quints could do was foul during the first half and all the Techmen could do was score. At midway the Owls led 49-21.
