

### Woman Stakes Claim To Three World Records

FORT WORTH, Tex. (AP)—Dr. Dora Dougherty, who has claimed three world records after only 34 hours of flying time as a helicopter pilot, wants some competition from her sister flyers.

"I hope somebody breaks my records tomorrow," she said Friday after bettering the women's world solo distance record for straight line flight held by the Soviet Union and staking claim to the first official mark in point-to-point speed. Last Wednesday she climbed higher than the world altitude record held by the Soviet Union.

"Give me some sleep, and I'll be ready to try myself," she said with a chuckle and a merry twinkle in her brown eyes.

Dr. Dougherty, 39, is a psychologist who has been doing research in pilot performance and cockpit design for Bell Helicopter Company for 2½ years.

But her first love is flying. "I can't remember when I was not interested in flying," the St. Paul, Minn., native said. "I even built model airplanes when I was a kid."

She has more than 3,700 hours as pilot of fixed-wing planes and was the sixth woman in the United States to qualify for an airline transport pilot's license. She is one of the about 30 women outside the U.S.S.R. who hold a helicopter pilot's license.

Although she got her helicopter license in December 1959 she had only 25 hours flying time when she began preparing for her assault on the world records a week ago.

"I wanted to show that American women pilots are as good as the Russians," she said.

Last Wednesday she climbed in a Bell 47G3 to 19,406 feet, passing the world record altitude of 14,764 feet made March 27, 1959, by Tatiana Roushan of the Soviet Union.

Friday she flew the same light-weight commercial ship from the Bell plant at Hurst, near here, to Jackson, Miss., a distance of 404.36 miles, bettering the record of 340.346 miles set last June 25 by Anna Gueppena of the Soviet Union.

Her speed for the flight was 91.26 miles per hour. There is no recognized record for point-to-point speed, but her time and the other two marks will be submitted to the Federation Aeronautique Internationale of Paris, France, for certification as world records.

### Case Of Stolen Kiss Settled Before Judge

DEDHAM, Mass. (AP)—Civil action over a stolen kiss was settled in District Court Friday but only the judge, who conducted the case in his lobby, the lawyers, and the principals know the terms. The decision was not placed on the record.

Helen Hubbard, 35, mother of three, sued Atwood E. Dickson, 59, for \$10,000.

She said she was kissed by Dickson two days before last Christmas when he delivered a telegram.

The attractive woman said the weather was cold and she invited Dickson inside while she signed for the message and he asked: "Don't you have mistletoe?"

"I said 'no' and when I handed him the receipt he grabbed me by the waist and attempted to kiss me on the mouth. I pushed him toward the door. He went out and said 'Merry Christmas' and I slammed the door and chain on it," Mrs. Hubbard said.

She testified she was upset for weeks and "I lost patience with my husband and my children."

Dickson, a grocer who delivers telegrams, admitted he asked about the mistletoe.

"I had the Christmas spirit," he said. "As she was signing the receipt I leaned over and gave her a little peck on the cheek. I didn't try to grab her. I had no intentions of assaulting her."

"I went back later in the day with two policemen and apologized."
