 Jack Douglass, Bill Grimes and Dr. Donald Bauer from the Oregon Technical Institute staff attended the Governor's Prayer Breakfast at the Marion Hotel in Salem Thursday morning. Marion Burke, businessman from Seattle, was guest speaker for the invitational affair. His subject was "The Freedom of Man and the Freedom of Worship."

Truck Tax Cut Wins Approval

SALEM (AP) — The Senate Highway Committee approved Thursday a tax cut for heavy trucks that would reduce the heavy trucker's share of highway costs by about \$1 million annually. The truck tax reduction levels out the rate curve on a weight-mileage basis and would give trucks of more than 44,000 pounds a tax reduction.

The measure had been opposed by Chairman Milo Melver of the state Highway Commission. He said heavy trucks should pay a greater share of the highway costs instead of less.

A truck weighing 76,000 gross pounds would get about a 6 mill tax reduction per mile if the bill passes.

The committee also voted to table a bill that would require certificates of necessity for log trucks. This had the effect of killing the bill.

Members of the committee contended that the log truckers themselves could not agree on the bill but said it might be reconsidered later if log truckers came forward in agreement.
