'Hardluck' Craig Joins LA Dodgers

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Pitcher Roger Craig, 1960's hardluck player, will be throwing for the Los Angeles Dodgers again this season.

He and three rookies joined the Los Angeles fold Monday by sending their signed contracts to General Manager E. J. Bavasi.

Craig had ended the 1959 season in brilliant form as a key man in the Dodgers' pennant drive.

At the beginning of last season Craig expected to pick up where he had left off, but on May 2 he was bowled over covering the plate in a game with Cincinnati and suffered a broken collarbone. That disabled the pitcher until June 20 and he didn't earn a starting assignment until July 4.

Then he had a six-game winning streak through Sept. 5.

Craig later said that had it not been for the collision at the plate with Vada Pinson he might have had his finest season.

He did well enough, however, for the lanky hurler finished the year with an 8-3 record and a \$26 earned run average which got him a raise estimated at about \$1,000 and boosted his salary to about \$18,500 for this season.

CHILOQUIN (Special)—Eight of the top Pacific Coast All-Indian basketball teams will compete in a three-day elimination tournament starting here Thursday afternoon to determine the team to represent the area in the annual Klamath Reservation Jaycees' All-Indian Tournament here in March.

The eliminations will begin at 4:30 Thursday with a two-game session and continue through Saturday with a doubleheader each evening. There are no afternoon games planned on either Friday or Saturday.

Thursday's opener pairs two Portland teams, the Phoenix Inn and the Red Hawks. At 5:30 p.m. Hoopa and Sprague River will square off.

The evening opener matches the Thunderbirds with San Francisco at 7:30 while the Chiloquin Hunters and the Beatty Lakers will compete in the nightcap which is scheduled to start at 8:30 p.m.

The Friday night action, which pairs the Thursday winners, will get underway at 7:30 as will the Saturday night championship round.

The ultimate winner of the tourney will automatically become an entrant in the big eight team All-Indian tournament which brings to Chiloquin fans the cream of Indian basketballers from the western half of the United States.

The All-Indian tournament, initiated by the Jaycees in 1954, currently rates high among national tournaments of its type.

'O', Still Begin War On Records

NEW YORK (AP)—Records are beginning to topple in the offensive-minded National Basketball Association, with rookie Oscar Robertson knocking off one and Wilt Chamberlain closing in on three.

Robertson, who has scored 1,733 points for the Cincinnati Royals and is averaging 30.2 points a game, has surpassed the scoring record for backcourt performers established last season by Detroit's Gene Shue. Shue had 1,712 for the season. Robertson passed that total in his 57th game.

Robertson is a distant third in the individual scoring race behind the pacesetter Chamberlain, of Philadelphia, and runner-up Elgin Baylor of Los Angeles, league statistics released today show.

The Stilt has amassed 2,327 points for a 38.1 average, will crack his 1959-60 record of 2,707 if he maintains his present clip and could hit the 3,000-mark in the Warriors' final 18 games.

Chamberlain now leads Baylor—who has 2,067 points and a 35.9 average—by a commanding 269-point margin, and also is barreling toward rebound and field goal percentage records. He has 1,681 rebounds and is hitting from the field at a .495 clip.

Palmer Cops Phoenix Open

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — Amazing Arnold Palmer, 1960's undisputed king of golf, is off and winning at an even faster pace this year.

The long-hitting Miami muscleman defeated Doug Sanders by three strokes in a playoff Monday to cop the Phoenix Open championship, his second in six tournaments, and mark the fourth time this season he had finished among the top five money winners.

At this time a year ago, Palmer had lined up with the first five at the pay window only once. That was when he won the Palm Springs title. He wound up the year with eight championships and official prize money totaling more than \$75,000.

Playing with the aggressive, chance-taking style which has stamped him as the game's greatest finisher, Palmer went after Sanders early. He took the lead with a birdie on the second hole and never relinquished it.

After both players, tied at the end of the regulation 72 holes at 270, bogied the first hole, Palmer fired nothing but pars and birdies. He came in with a three-under-par 67 in spite of a one-stroke penalty for an unplayable lie in the top of a palm tree on No. 18. He recovered for a par 3 on that one.

Sanders, who got into the play-off with a Arizona Country Club course record 62 Sunday, finished with a 70 on two birdies, two bogies and 14 pars. He beat Palmer on only one hole, that when he birdied the 16th. His other birdie came on the par-5 eighth hole and was matched by Palmer.

The winner took \$4,300 in prize money. Sanders won \$3,000, and they split 50 per cent of the extra day's gate receipts, giving each an estimated additional \$1,000.

His prize, exclusive of gate receipts, ran Palmer's official tournament money for the year to \$12,425 and lifted him to second place on the bankroll list. Gary Player, winner of the rich San Francisco Open, picked up \$325 in Phoenix and still leads the pack with \$13,727.

Kentucky, Colorado Lower The Boom; Ohio Staters Breeze To 24th Straight

It probably isn't an omen for the O-men, but Ohio State's rumpaging Buckeyes might take heed of what happened to Mississippi State and Kansas State.

Until Monday night those two teams were rambing along in their conference basketball races almost as comfortably as Ohio has been in the Big Ten. Then Kentucky and Colorado lowered the boom as effectively as Clancy ever did and now almost anything could happen in the Southeastern Conference and the Big Eight.

Ohio State, meanwhile, made it 24 straight in their two-year string with an 89-65 victory over Northwestern that wasn't particularly pleasing to Coach Fred Taylor. He thought his team "seemed to let down a bit." The Bucks' turn could come next, if they do let down — possibly against determined Iowa Saturday.

Kentucky, going nowhere but making itself felt in the Southeastern race, handed Mississippi State's Maroons their first conference defeat, 68-62, on the Maroons' court. Colorado saved enough of an early lead to beat Kansas State 81-80 and knock the Wildcats, ranked sixth nationally

in The Associated Press poll, out of the Big Eight lead.

Kansas, which had been tied with K-State, moved out in front by crushing Missouri 88-72. Mississippi State still leads the SEC with an 8-1 record but Florida and Louisiana State moved up to tie beaten Vanderbilt for second at 6-3 while Kentucky, winning four straight, is 6-4.

One other conference leader met its first defeat when Eastern Kentucky whipped Western Kentucky 81-72. Western now is 7-1 and Eastern 7-2 in the Ohio Valley Conference, whose winner automatically qualifies for the NCAA tournament.

Amidst all this furor, independent St. Bonaventure, ranked second to Ohio State nationally, breezed to a 95-79 victory over NIT tournament-bound Providence. Tom Stitt led the Bonnies to their 10th straight and 19th in 29 games although he was outscored 30-23 by Jim Hadnot of Providence.

Iowa cling to second place with a 43-41 victory over Wisconsin as the reserves who took over for four ineligible regulars won their second straight. Third-place Purdue trimmed Indiana 64-55 and Michigan won its first Big Ten game, beating Michigan State 78-67.

OSU Bucks, Bonnies Hold Poll Berths

The continued rise of Cincinnati and Kansas State to positions of national prominence marked this week's voting in The Associated Press basketball poll as Ohio State and St. Bonaventure continued to hold the top two places.

Apparently nothing is going to disturb the Buckeyes (10-0) and the Bonnies (18-1) unless they get beaten. Meanwhile, the two teams from the powerful midlands conferences keep moving up, and they could be ready to hand out those likings by the time the NCAA tournament rolls around.

For the ninth straight week Ohio State drew all the first place votes of the AP panel of sports writers and broadcasters for a perfect 300 point score. St. Bonaventure had 35 second-place votes and one third for 323 points.

Cincinnati, not even in the top 10 two weeks ago, moved up to fourth as it moved to the front in the Missouri Valley Conference race. The Bearcats (17-3) were fifth last week. Kansas State (15-3) held 10th place in mid-January, dropped out for a week and then climbed back to sixth this week.
