Blacklist Sale Of Candy By Girls' Group

PORTLAND (AP) — The Multnomah County Labor Council decided Monday night to blacklist a candy sale by Camp Fire Girls in Multnomah and Washington counties, saying the candy was purchased in California at a time when many workers were jobless here.

Mrs. Betty Sale, an executive for the Camp Fire Girls here, said a California firm underbid Portland candy makers and agreed to take back a portion of any unsold candy. "No local firm would agree to take any of its candy back," she said. The California candy is union made, she added.

The council was told by Austin Haughey, director of union label promotion for the Oregon AFL-CIO, that candy sold here from 1951 to 1959 was made in Portland, and last year provided \$10,000 income for Portland candy makers.

Mrs. Sale said 90,000 boxes of candy were sold last year, at \$1 a box.

John Wilson, community services chairman for the council, said the council had repeatedly supported the Camp Fire Girls, but added "... it is about time that they learn that they can't have their cake and eat it too."

To Tribute The Farmer

TULELAKE — Farmers are coming in for more recognition. The Treasury Department has announced plans to pay tribute to agriculture during 1961—the 20th anniversary year of the Savings Bond Program.

The plan calls for setting aside a special month for paying honor to each segment of the economy. The "Tribute to Agriculture" month is November. At that time, outstanding farm leaders will join treasury officials in giving proper recognition to the farm population, which owns more than five billion dollars worth of United States Savings Bonds.

William H. Neal, assistant to the secretary of the treasury, and national director of the Savings Bond Program, said: "Farmers have always been steady purchasers of Savings Bonds, and the five billion dollars backlog they hold today is a bulwark of strength in our rural economy. The treasury is proud to pay tribute to that group of patriotic citizens who are responsible for America being the best-fed, best-clothed nation in the world."

Storm Brings Needed Water
MOUNT SHASTA — A three-day storm at the end of January was all that kept the month from going on record as the driest January in Mount Shasta's weather history, according to the statistics compiled at the U.S. Weather Bureau station here.

The 2.73 inches of rainfall in that storm provided 83 per cent of the January moisture and spoiled the record to the extent of making the month the driest since 1949.

Total for the month were Weed, 2.04 inches; McCloud, 4.5 inches; Dunsmuir, 5.87 inches; and Mt. Shasta Ski Bowl, six inches — bringing 60 inches of snow. Temperatures were above normal with a 39.6 average in Mount Shasta. This is 6.8 degrees above the January normal and the highest since 1934.

Concentrates Do Well

Superintendent Sued Over Loss Of Position

EUGENE (AP) — The superintendent of Medford schools is being sued for \$32,000 by a former employee of the state system of higher education who claims he lost his job because of the superintendent's interference.

The suit was filed in Lane County Circuit Court. Leonard C. Mayfield, Medford school superintendent, is defendant.

The suit was brought by Raymond E. Pettey, now of Portland. The complaint alleges that Pettey was an assistant professor with the general extension division and on Jan. 26, 1960, Mayfield sent a letter to Pettey's superior in Eugene asking that Pettey be discharged.

Pettey asked \$37,000 general damages and \$15,000 punitive damages.

The attorney for the plaintiff said Tuesday the suit arose out of an incident in which Pettey, who had offices at Southern Oregon College in Ashland, gave a Medford newspaper reporter statistics about the adult education program of Medford schools.

charged. On Feb. 29 Pettey was relieved of his position.

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Money May Be Backed By Silver Wire In Machine

WASHINGTON (AP) — Some of the silver that was carried around in your wallet may be backed by silver wire in an Atomic Energy Commission machine at Oak Ridge, Tenn.

The AEC is still using some of the silver it borrowed from the Treasury Department during World War II when copper wire was in short supply.

But there's no danger the Treasury will renege on any of its silver certificates. Under the original loan agreement, dollars can be issued against the AEC silver stock, although it may be part of an electromagnetic separator.

Use of the silver by the AEC 16 years after World War II ended came to light during research by aides to Sen. Jacob K. Javits, R-N.Y., on the international balance of payments problem.

Javits, a member of the Senate Banking Committee, today made public a letter from the AEC explaining its use of Treasury silver.

During World War II, the Manhattan Engineering District—war-time predecessor to the AEC and developer of the atomic bomb—borrowed from the Treasury \$27,814,449 ounces of silver valued at over \$20 million.

Because of a copper shortage, the silver was used in bars and coils installed in the electromagnetic separations plant at Oak Ridge.

Since the end of World War II the AEC has returned 363,062.82 ounces of silver to the Treasury but retains 64,751,316 ounces valued at \$59.6 million.

"This silver on hand is still in coils, some of which are being used in the stable isotope program, with the remainder being held for future use or return to the Treasury," the AEC said in its letter to Javits.

The AEC is attempting to develop new uses for nonradioactive isotopes—heavy atoms of elements—in its stable isotope program.

Why can't the AEC replace the silver with copper and return it to the Treasury?

Because, Javits' aides said, it would cost an enormous amount of money to do the job. They said the AEC plans to send the silver back to the Treasury depositories when the machines can no longer be used.

The largest depository is located at the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, N.Y. At latest count the Treasury had stored there 940 million ounces of silver valued at \$1.2 billion.

Drunk Driver On Probation
ALTURAS — John Michael DeCarbonel, who pleaded guilty to a charge of felony drunk driving here Feb. 2, was placed on probation Friday by Judge Ben Currier of the county superior court.

DeCarbonel was the driver of a car that overturned on Modoc County Road 59 at 2:15 a.m. Jan. 15. Seven youths were passengers and three were injured, one seriously.

Judge Currier stated he passed the sentence of three years probation on recommendation of the probation officers. A heavier penalty was suspended.

The court also directed that DeCarbonel make regular monthly payments to help cover cost of medical and hospital expenses of Tom Rice who was injured most seriously.

He suffered head and back injuries and is expected to remain hospitalized another three months.

Judge Gives Suspended Term
ALTURAS — Leonard E. Smith was given a suspended sentence and placed on three years probation Friday by Judge Ben Currier of Modoc County Superior Court.

Smith was charged with attempting to set fire to a haystack. He was granted permission to go to Auburn, Wash., to take a job on condition that he make regular written or oral reports to Uel B. Marr, Modoc County probation officer.
