

BPA Official Sees No Region Power Shortage

SPOKANE (AP)—A Bonneville Power Administration official says there will be a power shortage in the Northwest by 1965. But he says an atomic reactor and provisions of a proposed U.S.-Canada treaty will ease the strain after that.

Miller Evans, director of the BPA division of operations and maintenance, made the statements at a field supervisory training conference.

Another speaker, J. Lane Worthland, assistant BPA administrator, said the Northwest has a power surplus now mostly because industrial customers are not operating at full capacity.

Evans said the region would be short 117,000 kilowatts by 1965-66 and 963,000 by 1969-70.

But he said projects under the U.S.-Canada storage treaty could supply 792,000 kilowatts to the region's power output by 1965-66 and 1,487,000 by 1969-70.

He said another 352,000 kilowatts could be added by 1965-66 with the new reactor under construction at Hanford Atomic Works, and it could supply 765,000 kilowatts by 1969-70.

Churchman Hits Plan

PORTLAND (AP)—Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller's educational aid plan in New York came under attack of the executive director of the Protestants and Other Americans United for Separation of Church and State Tuesday night.

"The proposal backed by Gov. Rockefeller in New York state to provide grants of \$200 each for students in private colleges is a stab in the back to the principle of church-state separation," said Glenn L. Archer, Washington, D.C., at the group's national convention.

"We must inform Mr. Rockefeller that he can never hope to attain the White House by this means. Nobody, including him, will be permitted to sell out the American heritage."

"This is nothing but a back-door subsidy to church institutions, nine-tenths of which are wholly owned and operated by the Roman Catholic Church. If this duplicity should succeed in the New York legislature, and if the courts should sustain it—a horrifying prospect—then the separation of church and state as we have known it is done."

"We need to tell the New York governor that this is a Judas Iscariot maneuver by a Protestant who knows better," Archer said. Archer added that the proposal was "in plain contravention of the New York state constitution and of the First Amendment to the federal constitution as the Supreme Court has consistently interpreted it."

Judge Places 3 Young KF Men On Probation

Three young Klamath Falls men were placed on probation Tuesday afternoon by Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg, two for stealing car parts and the third for an attempted burglary.

Two of the young men are high school students: Fred E. Fleet, 18, 221 North Tenth Street, and Merle Lee Tracy, 19, 1017 Melrose Avenue. They were both placed on probation for three years for stealing a generator, battery, voltage regulator, breather caps and spark plug wires from a car belonging to Lawrence E. Smith, 515 Jefferson Street.

The judge established strict probation rules for the youths and warned them that one violation would send them to prison. He ordered them to refrain from driving, drinking and smoking and further ordered them to attend school every day and keep reasonable hours.

Trading Stamps

SALEM (AP)—Legislation to regulate the use of trading stamps was introduced in the House today. Opponents said the bill's purpose is to kill the stamps.

The bill would eliminate exclusive franchises for merchants, and require that the stamps be redeemable in cash as well as in merchandise.

It is expected to evoke a storm of protest from housewives. Rep. C. R. Hoyt, R-Corvallis, sponsored the bill.

John Beinert, San Francisco, vice president of Sperry & Hutchinson Co., biggest trading stamp company in the nation, said the bill's purpose is to kill trading stamps. He said the stamp companies can not operate without exclusive franchises.
