Hill has stopped skating except occasionally purely for pleasure. He joined the Army before World War II erupted. On doctor's orders, he began to skate to loosen up a leg he injured in an accident while in the service.

Hill became professional proficient in 1939 and worked with a rink in San Francisco, then in Springfield, Mass.

When his three-year tour of duty was complete, Hill went back into civilian life, then enlisted with the Army Air Corps in 1941, was discharged in 1945, remained a civilian for about three years, rejoined the Army and transferred to the Air Force when it became a separate military branch in 1948.

He has been with the Air Force since and is a technical sergeant. Hill lacks only a few months of 20 years of service time.

Weird-Looking Suit Developed For Moon Trips

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The newest thing in moon suits is an awesome monster 7½ feet tall in which an astronaut can explore the lunar surface for days at a time without having to return to base.

When perfected the weird-looking suit should enable the explorer to:

1. Feed himself from cans carried inside its bulbous, 30-inch-diameter aluminum torso.
2. Drive his "moon jeep" with a remote control panel, also built into the torso.
3. Leave the jeep and walk about surveying and collecting rock samples.

"Space Suit, Lunar Exploration, MKI" was modeled Wednesday by Dr. John Lyman, head of the biotechnology laboratory of the University of California at Los Angeles.

Lyman and a group of students next month will begin working on the bugs out of the suit, loaned to UCLA for this purpose by designer Allyn B. Hazard, who recently disclosed plans for the moon-jeep that goes with it.

As new members of the local Red Cross Home Service Committee, Mrs. Julia Brown and Mrs. Eric Majors learn that the American Red Cross is providing services currently to 2,500,000 U.S. military personnel in the 50 states and 50 other countries where military assignments have continued during the "cold war" since the Korean conflict ended in 1953.

Red Cross field directors are stationed at all military installations and hospitals; home service workers, staff or volunteer, are in the 3,700 chapters covering every county in the United States to serve the family of soldier, sailor or marine.

In this community, the Red Cross chapter has a unique role in that it has a dual personality, serving as a field director agent for men stationed at Kingsley Field and continuing its Home Service program. This activity is directed by a committee of volunteers who meet monthly to review cases and act in an advisory capacity to the local office staff.
