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No Action Taken On Proposal For Road Funds

YREKA — No action was taken by the Siskiyou County Board of Supervisors on the proposed resolution presented by A. A. Powers, county road commissioner, at Tuesday's meeting to ask the state legislature to devise a means of financing a program to correct road and highway deficiencies in California counties and cities.

Powers did not specify how such a program should be financed.

In other action by the board, W. M. van Over, county welfare director, was authorized to attend a meeting of the Welfare Directors Association to be held in Willows Thursday and Friday.

Authorization to the county tax collector to sell certain tax-deeded property was postponed until supervisors have opportunity to study the proposed list of property.

The board acknowledged announcement by F. H. Christensen, county airport coordinator, that the Federal Aviation Administration may return to its program of appropriating money for airport development.

314 Persons Are Arrested

YREKA — According to a report by Yreka Chief of Police Henry T. Watson, his department arrested 314 persons during 1960, 94 of which were juveniles.

Watson pointed out that drinking was the largest cause of arrests. A total of 88 persons were arrested for drunkenness, 41 for drunk driving and 39 for disorderly conduct.

Other arrests included 11 burglaries, 11 grand thefts, four auto thefts (all by juveniles), two assaults, seven forgeries, seven offenses against children and families, 16 vagrancies, and one rape. A total of 65 persons were picked up for investigation and not charged. Watson added there were 23 miscellaneous arrests.

Drought Hits Rangeland

SACRAMENTO (UPI) — Drought conditions during December and January sent rangeland and livestock conditions plunging, but the State Livestock Reporting Service says recent rains should improve the picture.

The agency said Wednesday that supplemental feeding of cattle and sheep was continuing heavily after the two-month dry spell, but was expected to decline as soon as new grass gains sufficient growth from rains of the last two weeks.

Pasture condition in the Feb. 1st report was listed at 67 per cent of normal, down 12 points from January, but still 1 point above the very poor condition of the same time last year.

The condition of cattle and calves dropped from 82 per cent of normal in January to 78 per cent this month, two points above last year's rating. The service said the decline was more significant in view of the fact that conditions usually improve during January.

A two-point shrink was noted for sheep and lambs, which were reported at 81 per cent of normal, compared to 78 per cent last year. Rain-free weather helped lambing, and a good crop was being realized. Losses of both lambs and ewes were light.

V. Ralston Is Elected

YREKA — New officers were elected at the annual shareholders' meeting of the Siskiyou Grange Credit Union, recently held at the Greenhorn Grange Hall, with Wayne O. Ralston, president, conducting the session.

Elected as directors for the coming year were Wayne O. Ralston, Kenneth Bley, Harry Crutchfield and Fred Caldwell, Ed Axte and Roland Dexter were named on the credit committee and elected to the supervisory committee were Lillian Petee and Ila Strain.

A report was given by Wayne Ralston, followed by an explanation of the dividends by Kenneth Bley, showing that the Credit Union is able to pay a three per cent dividend this year.

The financial and statistical report was read by Marjorie A. Bley, treasurer, which showed a loan balance of \$105,186.98, share balance of \$94,076.65 and total assets of \$120,821.46.

Dividend checks and reports were distributed during the session.

Clarence E. Murphy, managing director of the California Credit Union League of Oakland, spoke on the action of a credit union. The talk was followed by a question and answer period.

The evening was concluded with the serving of refreshments to the 48 members present.

Gold Measure Is Introduced By Congressman

YREKA — Congressman Harold T. (Bizz) Johnson, representing much of California's gold country, has introduced legislation aimed at reopening the nation's gold mines and replenishing dwindling gold reserves.

The congressman's proposal, sponsored in the Senate by Sen. Clair Engle, would authorize the secretary of interior to make incentive payments above the price of gold to domestic miners during the next five years.

"Not only would this breathe new life into our distressed gold industry," declared Johnson, "it would help restore our dwindling gold reserves and in that manner help retain stability of the dollar."

The gold reserves have slipped to a total of \$17,500,000,000. The incentive program is designed to restore this to the 23 billion dollar level, he said.

Incentive payments would vary depending upon the amount needed to enable each mine to get into production. In no case would payments exceed \$35 an ounce above the \$35 market price.

Johnson said this legislation would not establish a two-price system for gold, nor would it affect the monetary price of gold which would remain at \$35 an ounce.

The dance at which the disturbances occurred was not specifically a teen-age dance, but was advertised as a public benefit dance for the March of Dimes. However, most of those present were teen-agers, police stated.

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Yreka Lumber Plans Move To New Location

YREKA — According to Harold Chaney, new owner-operator of the Yreka Lumber Company, the firm plans to move from its site on Elsie Street to the building formerly occupied by Nor-Cal Electric.

Chaney stated that the Nor-Cal building will offer better merchandising advantages and customer convenience.

Current plans are that the Yreka Lumber Company will construct additional storage sheds and convert the present Nor-Cal building into a combination retail store and storage building.

The business, according to Chaney, will start moving into the new location by April 1 and will be completely moved by May 1.
